# BB Gun shooters take second at state

**By DICK BOYD** nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton County Rotary BB Gun team compiled another excellent shooting and written test score in the 43rd annual State BB Gun Championships in Alma on Saturday but was edged by an

outstanding team from Wyandotte

County to place second overall. Norton just missed a 38th state championship since the beginning of the gun shooting safety program by the U.S. Jaycees. The young Blue Jays were outscored on the firing line by just three points and on the written test by 18 points.

Third place went to the Derby No.1 team.

The top three teams from each state shoot qualify for competition in the Daisy/Jaycees International BB Gun Championships which will be held again this year in Bowling Green, Ky. on July 4-6.

Wyandotte County won the championship with a shooting score of 1811, test score of 488 and total score of 2299.

The Norton Yellow Team shot an 1808 and scored 470 on the written test for a total of 2278.

Derby No.1 shot a 1798, had a test score of 464 and finished with a 2262 total. Winning fourth place was Pot-

a shooting score of 1783, test score of 460 for a 2243 total. Fifth place went to Derby No.2

with a 1737 shooting, 460 test and 2197 total. The Norton Blue Team per-

formed very well. They had the fifth best shooting score and placed sixth overall. They shot a 1738, had a test score of 442 and overall score of 2180.

Phillips County won seventh with a 1681 shooting, 466 test and

Eighth place went to Wyandotte No.2 with a 1663 shooting, 478 test and 2141 total.

The Norton Red Team had the seventh best shooting score and was ninth overall. They shot a 1720, had a test score of 420 and finished with an overall score of 2140, just one point out of eighth.

Rounding out the top ten was Jefferson County with a 1708 shooting score, 428 test and 2136

The quality of the competition in the state shoot this year can be determined by the fact that Norton won last year's championship by 58 points over the second place team and had a total score of 2282, just four points better than this year's Yellow squad. Last year's second place team would have placed fifth this year with their 2007 total.

Derby No.1 and Pottawatomie/ Riley County.

Although the scores from the written test of gun shooting safety were not posted until all shooting on the firing line had been completed, the written test was taken prior to the marksmanship.

Firing from the prone position, the easiest of the four, was first. Norton shot a 464 and was second behind Riley County's 474. Wyandotte No.1 shot a 463 and Derby No.1 recorded a 459.

The second firing position was the standing and it is considered to be the most difficult. Norton Yellow won that position with a 431, followed by Wyandotte's 429, Derby's 426 and Riley County's 415. That gave Norton Yellow a three point lead over Wyandotte with half of the shooting completed.

Norton Yellow had their poorest showing in the marksmanship from the sitting position. The young Blue Jays shot a 460 to record the fourth best score. Wyandotte shot a 472, Derby a 466 and Riley County a 461. After the sitting competition, Wyandotte took over the lead with a 1364, followed by Norton, 1355; Derby, 1351 and Riley County 1350.

The tougher the shooting positawatomie/Riley County 4-H with tion, the better the Norton marksmen usually do and that was the case in the fourth and final position, the kneeling, which is only surpassed in difficulty by the standing.

Just as they had in the standing marksmanship, the Norton Yellow shooters finished the day's competition by outshooting everyone else. Norton shot a 453, Wyandotte and Derby both shot a 447 and Riley County recorded a 433. That brought the final shooting score for Wyandotte to 1811 and Norton's to 1808.

The only scoring left was from the written test, which had not been posted. The Norton shooters, coaches, parents and fans hoped that their written test scores would be high enough to surpass Wyandotte but they recorded an outstanding 488 x 500 score compared to Norton's excellent 470 to win the title by just 21 points!

Wyandotte No.2 had the second best test score with a 478, followed by Norton and Flint Hills Junior Other teams and their total Shooters, each with a 470; Phillips scores were: Flint Hills Shooters County, 466; Derby No.1, 464; Riley County and Derby No.2,

> BB gun shooting consists of very precise, accurate marksmanship. Shooters fire their BB gun from a distance of 16-feet-4.75 inches and the center of the target is the same size as a BB. A perfect shot comes when the BB hits exactly on the center of the target. A bull's eye can be a few millimeters off center but not much.
