gets from firemen and police and sheriff's officers, especially when of the night.

However, she said, sometimes the patients are pretty heavy.

"Our cots are limited and we did have one individual, who weighed in excess of 300 pounds." she said.

Emergency medical technician Aden Schillig said he remembers one over 400 pounds and while the cots the service uses now are rated for 500 and 600 pounds, they get pretty squeaky with heavy loads.

Mr. Schillig said he had had a chance to use the electric-assist cots, which use electricity to raise and lower themselves and have their own generator for power.

"They are really awesome," he said, adding that he thinks they would be well worth the money.

Commissioner John Miller said the county's workers comp insurance representative has told him that that type of cot is pretty cheap compared to paying a claim for a back injury.

Mrs. Wyatt said that she would like two cots for the county's most used ambulances but she has to prioritize what she buys.

One problem with the electric cots, she said, is they are about 25 pounds heavier than the others. "I've never been able to tell the dif-

ference between 325 pounds and 350 pounds," Mr. Schillig said, adding that because the cots raise and lower themselves they don't seem so heavy and you don't move them like you do a regular cot.
