Plus we get one free Coke each shift. Gosh, sixty-five cents every hour and a Coke! I had no idea how rewarding this job was going to be.

Saturday morning I am up early getting dressed when the telephone rings. I hear my mother say "Oh, I am so sorry. Yes, I'll tell her right away." She comes slowly into my bedroom and sits down on the bed with a sigh. "Better just put your jeans on Liza Beth," she says. "That was Mr. Cleland on the phone. The drugstore and most of that whole block burned to the ground last night." I burst into tears and Mama pulls me down beside her for a consoling hug. "I know how disappointed you must be," she says, "but you only lost a job. Just think of Mr. Cleland and all the other fellows downtown who have lost their entire livelihood."

EPILOGUE: WaKeeney lost the entire business block south of the courthouse that night. The drug store, the bakery, a jewelry shop, an appliance store, our only furniture store, as well as doctor, dentist and insurance offices above the buildings all went up in flames because the fire doors had rusted solid in the open position. By the time Cleland's built anew in a different location I was away at school in Salina. I never got that dream job. Wonder if I could still run a soda fountain if the opportunity ever arose?



Megan Nealene Hillebrand and Matthew Alan Stevenson plan to marry Saturday, May 31.


