#### 'C' and 'D' tag deadline nears

Wednesday, April 30 is the deadine to renew automobile, light truck, motorcycle or motorized bike tags if your last name or business name begins with 'C' or 'D'. When renewing your vehicles, remember to include your current proof of insurance for all vehicles. The County Treasurer's office needs to verify the VIN number, policy number and current expiration\_date. Computers are shut off at 4:30 p.m. daily for balancing.

As a reminder, the office can only renew regular driver's licenses and issue ID cards. Our hours are Tuesday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Effective Jan. 1, 2006 all CDL licenses have to be renewed at a full service office: Phillipsburg, Hays and Colby.

Second half of 2007 taxes are due by May 10. Since that is a Saturday, the office will extend the date to the 12. To ensure proper credit to your taxes bring or send your payment

#### AP report of no concern locally

An Associated Press report appearing in Thursday papers and on radio and television newscasts had some Norton residents concerned. The report dealt with uranium in water in nine Kansas communities, including Norton.

Rob Lawson, Norton city administrator, said in a telephone interview Thursday The Associated Press report was nothing new to the people out here. "We've been dealing with this matter for several years," he said. The city distributes a letter quarterly to water users as a caution and to update them as to what the uranium levels show.

Mr. Lawson said the new water plant construction is 90 percent complete and the next phase of the project will deal with water wells. "It's just a matter of time (for solving this issue)," he said.

The other named sites are Atwood, Oberlin, Clay Center, Gaylord, Morganville, Lakin, Rooks County Rural Water District 1 and a water supply in a Garden City subdivision.

## Andbe Home seeks assistance

The Andbe Home is making needed repairs and is looking for the money to pay

Commissioners on Monday about getafter Feb.4, she said. ting some help next year to help pay for repairs the facility needs to stay open in Ms. McGinnis told the commissioners

that the home is trying to make repairs required by state regulators to the facility's floor, walls, handrails, counter tops, closet doors, wood surfaces and heating units. Some of the repairs, she said, are

required immediately and some will be needed to pass future inspections. The state inspectors visited the facility

in January, she said, and found deficiencies related to the building but not quality of care. Because of the problems, mostly nis and directors Ruth Burd and Dwight with maintenance, the state said it would Heikes talked to the Norton County not pay for Medicare patients admitted The home, which now has 54 residents,

has taken in three Medicare patients since then, she said. Of those, one is in hospice and one died. However, the facility has lost \$10,000 as of the end of March because of this.

Ms. Burd said that she hates to see people turned away because they will go elsewhere, which could be hard for them,

their families and the Andbe Home. However, she said, the facility cannot afford to take any more Medicare patients until the ban is lifted, which she thinks it will be when the state rechecks the facility.

Repairs are being made as fast as possible and plans have been made for regular maintenance so that the problems will not reoccur. However, so far, the state has not come back to re-inspect.

The home has requested a grant from the Hansen Foundation to make some of the repairs but some things could not be put in the request and some the facility is looking for help elsewhere, Ms. McGinnis said, adding that she hopes the commissioners can put the home in the 2009
