# Banquet honors Blue Jay wrestling team

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Bill Johnson's Norton Community High School wrestling team was honored for another excellent season during the annual banquet on Sunday evening in the Norton junior high gymnasium.

With 11 returning lettermen and four returning state medalists, the wrestling Blue Jays compiled another impressive record en route to a fourth place finish in the Class 3-2-1A state tournament

In his 17th season at Norton, coach Johnson guided his Blue Jay wrestling team to a 9-1 dual record. Their only dual loss was to a strong, talented Kearney, Neb. team.

Norton opened the dual season by beating Phillipsburg 46-24 on Fri., December 14. A dual with Stockton that night was canceled due to inclement weather. Norton was scheduled to compete that Saturday in the Goodland dual tournament but did not go due to inclement weather.

The Blue Jays started the new year by winning their fifth straight J.R. Durham Invitational Tournament championship in Norton. Included in the field of teams were defending co-state champions Smith Center and Beloit and and Ellis in league duals in Ellis perennial power Scott City. Norton had to face Smith Center in a dual the next Thursday in Wa-Keeney where the Golden Eagles were also an opponent. The Blue Jays edged the Redmen 30-28 and rolled over Trego 61-18. Norton won six matches and Smith Center won eight in their dual but three Blue Jay wins by falls were the

After the Smith Center and Trego duals, Norton left for Newton for the prestigious Tournament of Champions. The Blue Jays won the championship in 2005 and 2006 but did not compete

In fact, Norton is the smallest school to ever win this tournament. Defending state champions Manhattan, 6A; Wichita Bishop Carroll, 5A and Clay Center, 4A. were all present this year. Norton wrestled well and placed ninth, just two points out of seventh.

Then, it was on to a dual in Hays with Kearney, Neb. and Hays on Tues., January 22. Norton shutout Hays 82-0 but lost 49-10 to Kearney, one of the top teams in Nebraska.

On Sat., January 26, the Blue Jays hosted the Mid-Continent League Tournament and powered to their ninth straight championship. Norton scored 204 points

> Norton won their 13th consecutive Mid-Continent League dual championship by defeating Hill City and Osborne in duals on Thurs., February 7.

> The Regional Tournament was held the next two days in WaKeeney and the Blue Jays won their fourth straight regional championship. Norton scored 226.5 points and second place Scott City tallied 160.

Norton qualified 11 of their 14 wrestlers for the state tournament. Blue Jay senior Alex Thomas would have been No.12 had he not received a season-ending knee injury after pinning his first two opponents in the 185 pound weight class. He finished the season 27-2 after the injury default.

Norton junior Jordan Bebb placed fourth in the regional at 171 pounds and qualified for the state tournament but did not compete due to injury.

"In all my years of coaching, I've never had a team come this close to qualifying all of our wrestlers for the state tournament," said coach Johnson.

Norton regional champions were: freshman Billy Broeckelman, 112; sophomore Kaenon and second place Smith Center Keiswetter, 125; sophomore Zane Perez, 130 and junior Zach Baint-

The next weekend, the Blue Jays competed in the State Tournament in Hays. Friday was not a good day for Norton wrestlers and they knew they would have to win many matches through the back door on Saturday to finish

They did just that as they scored twice as many points as the leading teams on Saturday and placed fourth. Smith Center won the championship with 127.5 points and Phillipsburg was second with 126.5. Beloit was third with 121.5 and Norton scored 101.5.

State tournament medalists for Norton were: Billy Broeckelman, second; freshman Troy Bainter, third, 103; Kaenon Keiswetter, third; Zach Bainter, third; senior Todd Bolt, fifth, 140; freshman Landon Keiswetter, sixth, 119.

Competing in the state tournament but not placing were: Zane Perez, senior Jeff Soderlund, 152; junior Matt Stanley, 160 and junior Brock Lauer, 189.

Assistant coaches again this season were: Doug Ray, Shane Miller and Chance McKinney. Student managers were: Emily Juenemann, Alyssa Thomson and Shelby Schaefers.

Following a potluck meal, coach Johnson and his assistant coaches spoke to the wrestlers, parents and fans and presented awards.

The "Most Outstanding Wrestler" award, the most prestigious of all, was presented to Zach Bainter, who placed in every tournament this season and finished third in his weight class in the state tournament.

Zach compiled the second highest winning percentage on the team this season with a 31-3 record and scored 152 points, also second high. He tied for first in the number of major decisions, was third in decisions, second on the team in takedowns and tied for third in falls.

"The Whitneys have been a very integral part of wrestling in Norton over the last 30 years," said coach Johnson as they received a standing ovation.
