Corner

Missouri spring has been a tumultuous season thus far. Somehow, though, the combination of wet and chilly days, winds and occasional hail managed to combine with warm, sunny crispness to bring forth an amazing and almost overnight transformation. This week a drive through Shawnee Mission treated our group to flowering crab, redbuds and Bradford pear trees, bursting with blossoms and scenting the air with their sweetness. Golden forsythia, Japanese magnolias and pure white dogwood spread their glory far and wide. Daffodils, narcissus, hyacinths and tulips of every hue splashed color over yards where kitchen today should feature these cascades of purple creeping phlox two festive foods. Given, both are

delicious in their natural state, but both take to fancy flourishes as well. Here are two "spiffies", one for asparagus and another for strawberries.

FROM THE GARDENER: Asparagus season is short so harvest new stalks daily. Insert a sharp paring knife just under the surface of the soil and slice the stalk. Best when less than six to eight inches tall. Leave the spindly stalks to reseed.

Remember to water the asparagus bed with the salty water from the ice cream freezer - asparagus must have salt water to thrive. No ice cream freezer? Sprinkle rock salt along the row of asparagus before watering.

EMPORIA ESCALLOPED ASPARAGUS

(from a summer school friend) One pound of fresh young asparagus, cut into one-inch segments One big sweet red pepper, diced (save four nice rings for topping) One can sliced bamboo shoots

One cup grated Cheddar cheese, save a bit for topping

One cup coarsely crushed Twigs snack crackers, save a bit for topping

Four eggs beaten with a cup of whole milk

Salt, pepper, and a little onion powder to your taste

Two hot hard boiled eggs, sliced

Combine asparagus, diced pepper, bamboo shoots, cheese and most of the cracker crumbs with seasonings, add beaten egg-milk mixture. Pour into a deep 9x13 pan. (It will puff up some, allow space.) Top with the four red pepper rings and remaining crumbs. Bake for 30-40 minutes at 350 degrees or until filling is set. Slice the hot hard boiled eggs. Choose the four prettiest slices and place inside the red pepper rings. Chop the rest very fine and sprinkle around corners. Sprinkle on remainder of shredded cheese. Can be used as a meatless meal if desired.

STRAWBERRIES IN GLORY

Meringue crust: Three egg whites beaten with one cup sugar and two teaspoons vinegar. Bake in a nine-inch glass pie plate at 300 degrees for one and a half hours. Cool. If desired this meringue may be made into individual shells by dropping it in blobs onto a cookie sheet and creating hollows with the back of a wet tablespoon before baking. One year Mama and a friend even formed these into heart-shaped meringue cups tinted pink for a very la-ti-da ladies' luncheon.

Filling: Three egg yolks, beaten with half a cup of sugar, one cup of milk, a tablespoon of flour, pinch of salt and a teaspoon vanilla. Cook in double boiler until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Cool a bit, then stir half a cup of crushed, salted cashew nuts into this custard and pour it all into meringue crust. Cover generously with freshly sliced strawberries. Spread with whipped cream. Serve each piece with one whole cashew nut, curved around one whole strawberry and a sprig of fresh mint on top.
