The family of a little boy killed in a bicycle accident four years ago has turned their personal tragedy into a mission to promote bicycle safety for children in Norton and Phillips counties.

In 2004, Chaston VanDerVeen, 6, was killed when he failed to stop at a stop sign, and rode his bicycle into the path of an oncoming semi-truck. His family created the Chaston VanDerVeen Memorial Bicycle Safety Program that they take to local schools in Phillips and Norton counties during the last week of April and first week of May. The program is for kindergarten and first grade students. Local and state law enforcement officers help

conduct the program, emphasizing to the children the importance of obeying traffic laws and wearing a safety helmet.

Chaston's family donates bicycle helmets to any kindergarten student who does not have one and to any first grader who has outgrown their helmet. They also provide extra bicycles the day of the program so that every child will have a bike to ride.
