Quilters learn new use for toothbrushes

Heritage Quilt Club and a guest, Vickie Wendel, tried their hands at learning the art of toothbrush rug weaving at the April meeting. The original technique of making the toothbrush rug was brought to the United States by immigrants. During the 1930s it was modified to the method used today. The art was revived in the early 1980s.

Mary Hendricks, WaKeeney, was the teacher. She had a display of handwoven rugs she had made. Dress-weight cotton fabric or 80/20 cotton/polyester fabric is best to use. It will take at least 10 yards to make a rug.

Club members started their samples by making a loose chain stitch with a size "K" crochet hook. Then, using the toothbrush needle, threaded with fabric strips, you begin the weaving. Mary demonstrated the process of weaving, how to increase at corners, how to add strips and how to finish the end of your weaving. Most members agreed they needed lots of practice to master the art of toothbrush rug weaving.
