Question: 'Where's my check?' Answer: On its way, (maybe)

By TOM DREILING tom.d@nwkansas.com Some of you have received your economic stimulus checks by now. But most of you haven't. Matter of fact you may not get it this month or next. It may be July before it's in your hands. Or later.

Or maybe not at all. The Internal Revenue Service said it started sending out the economic stimulus payments last week — the *initial round* that will run right on up to around July 11.

The payments are being made by direct

2007 income tax returns that's how they wanted it handled. All others will receive their economic stimulus payments in the form of a paper check.

The payments are being sent out in the order of the last two digits of the Social Security number used on the tax return. Because the IRS will use the Social Security number to determine when checks million households. are mailed, taxpayers may receive their checks at different times than neighbors or other family members.



Norton teacher going into Hall of Fame

Eugene Wiltfong, a teacher in Norton County since 1941, will be inducted into the Class of 2008 Kansas Teachers' Hall of Fame in Dodge City on June 7.

Mr. Wiltfong taught in rural Gene Wiltfong schools, he coached,

taught science and was the elementary school principal from 1960 to 1981. During that time period he also served as assistant superintendent and from 1981 to 1988 he was the Norton Junior High principal and Norton school athletic legacy they can give their students. director.

Since his retirement in 1988, Mr. Wiltfong has been a substitute teacher and tutored "after school" students.

Mr. Wiltfong said, "I truly believe teaching is one of the most rewarding professions. Excellent school systems help children realize their potential in their preparation for their adult life.

"My goal as an educator was to instill a positive attitude for caring, respect, honesty, responsibility and faith to all my students.

"As an administrator, my goal was to provide and promote a positive school environment for students, faculty, parents and community. The way educators portray themselves is the most powerful

In his letter of recommendation for Mr. Wiltfong's induction, long-time Norton Community High School teacher and principal Lary Stull said, "Through his entire career in education, Eugene Wiltfong was never complacent or satisfied that we were doing our best. He was always searching and encouraging those around him to achieve, do better, to be on top of whatever could help students better themselves. Jane Kersenbrock, another former teacher who worked with Mr. Wiltfong, also wrote a letter of recommendation. In it she said, "Gene worked tirelessly to complete
