## E-waste trailer arrives, but tag hits snag

A trailer for gathering electronic waste has arrived but the license is still up in the air, Norton County commissioners

learned on Monday. The trailer has a tag, Solid Waste Supervisor Curt Archibald told the commissioners, but not the one it's supposed to have. The trailer has a regular county tag from Osborne County, he said, rather than a special government tag. Insurance problems are holding up the special tags, he said. although he assured the commis-

sioners that the trailer is insured. Norton County has joined a coalition of 10 counties to collect electronic waste like discarded televisions, radios, microwaves, cell phones and computers to keep them out of the landfills and to get them recycled. Osborne County has taken the lead on the project and is getting trailers sent out to all the coalition counties, Mr. Archibald said.

While it will be free for individuals to bring in their electronic waste items businesses will be charged 25 cents a pound. Of that the county will get 10 cents and the coalition 15 cents to help offset expenses. However, Mr. Archibald said, it's still unclear as to who will collect the money for distribution.

And, he said, 25 cents a pound only adds up to \$500 a ton, not a lot of money for the effort of collecting and recycling.

"It's cheaper to throw that baby in the trash,"he said.

Commissioner John Miller agreed but said the county couldn't do that.

"That's a problem with how they want to do this program," he said. "But remember, since we've become a member of this coalition, you can't throw it in the trash."

Commissioner Richard Thompson asked exactly what was included in the program and Mr. Achibald said that he had a list but that electronic devises would be included.

He said that there are still a few bugs to ersville, N.C. He was be worked out of the system.
