



• Compare costs for national brand products with the cost for a generic or store brand that may be produced at the same facility.

• Choose frozen fruit juice concentrates and re-constitute them as needed, rather than buying bottled versions that typically cost more.

• Keep a running list of prices for favorite items, and stock up during sales.

• Buy often-used items in bulk to save on packaging costs. If desired, measure out single servreusable containers, rather than purchase more costly pre-packaged single servings or relying on vending machines.

• Look for reduced-price foods that will work for upcoming meals. Ground beef may, for example, be reduced in price, but will need to be cooked the same or next day or frozen for future meals.

• Ask for a rain check to buy sale

frozen for future meals when time such as bagged dried beans, lentils and peas, dry milk powder, canned dry beans, canned tuna, frozen dry beans and peanut butter. These currently cost less than 10 cents for 6-8 grams of protein.

• Check recommended portions versus serving size. Trimming overly-generous portions can help reduce excess body weight - and food costs.

• Eat before shopping to reduce impulse purchases.


