This increase was recommended by Superintendent Griffith as a way to make much needed updates to the facilities. He said the high school gym floor is in need of replacement due to age and prior termite damage. Many of the sidewalks around both the Almena and Long Island buildings are in need of replacement, the roofs on all the buildings need to be repaired or replaced, and the playground equipment in Long Island needs to be replaced.

The City of Norton will hold a hearing to review and set policy for the use of "low-powered mechanically-propelled devices" in areas open to pedestrian use

City Attorney Karen Griffiths said she's been working with the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Department of Transportation regarding handicapped mobility, and that the Federal government will be adopting new guidelines regarding these devices. The government will ask municipalities to adopt some standards for the mobility devices, and there are some state guidelines that have to be met, she said.

"The city can require proof of disability and a doctor's statement," she said. "An example of proof of disability is if you have a handicap sticker for your vehicle,

2,884 registered to vote

tom.d@nwkansas.com Primary election day is Tuesday, Aug. 5 and if everyone who is registered to vote in Norton County actually votes, that means 2,884 people will be making their way to the polls.

The voter registration roll is pretty much a one-sided thing with 2,266 Republicans vs. 618 Democrats. Unaffiliated counts for more than the Democrats

-794 — but they are not eligible to cast a primary ballot.

Advanced voting continues. In order to cast a ballot prior to election day, a request form for such a ballot needs to be signed. A voter can mark an advanced ballot at the county clerk's office, or can take it home and return it when finishing marking it. The mail can also be used to secure an advanced ballot, but with election day just around the corner that might not be the best route to take.

All ballots need to be returned to the county clerk's office prior to election day. Further detailed explanations are available by contacting the helpful people in the county clerk's office and that number is 877-5710.

The lone primary race locally involves incumbent Sheriff Troy Thomson and challenger Brent Bohl. (The Telegram did an in-depth interview with both Mr. Thomson and Mr. Bohl that appeared in Tuesday's edition.)

City council hears water plant update
