ORDINANCE NO. 1577

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SOLID WASTE COLLECTION CHARGES OF THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS

Section 1. Section 15-502 of the Code of the City of Norton, Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows: 15-502

COLLECTION CHARGES. Those areas of the city zoned, designated and ordinarily used as residential areas (except mobile home parks), shall be provided the service of collection and disposal of residential solid waste by the city, and monthly charges shall be made to the owners or occupants of residential premises, to which the city solid waste collection and landfill disposal service is provided, in such periodic amounts as, from time to time, shall be established by ordinance of the governing body. Both a monthly solid waste collection charge and a landfill disposal charge shal be added to each monthly utility bill and such fees shall be pavable at the same time and under the same provisions that electrical and/or water service charges are collected.

(a) The solid waste collection charge, until further changed or modified by ordinance, shall be \$13.00 per month for each residential dwelling unit. (b) The landfill disposal charge, until further changed or modified by ordinance, shall be \$6.00 per month for a family dwelling unit, which shall be any residential premises occupied by two or more household members, or a charge of \$3.00 per month for a single occupant residential dwelling unit

Section 2. This ordinance becomes effective upon publication in the official city newspaper.
