## A peek inside the Carlyle and Mindrup homes

Judy Carlyle, 815 TimberCreek Road, is one of the stops on the Norton Arts Council’s *Homes Tour* this year.

In 2005, Ms. Carlyle bought the house without ever having seen the inside.

“I’d told family members what I was looking for, and they told me about this place. It looked well-kept, and I love red brick. I’d always wanted to own a red brick house,” said Ms. Carlyle.

Ms. Carlyle grew up in Norton County. She went to Bethany College and earned her registered nursing license. She has also lived in Colorado and California.

About a year and a half ago, Ms. Carlyle painted her great room, bedrooms and bathrooms.

When you walk through her door, the first thing you’ll see is a Maxfield Parrish print hanging in the foyer. The wall behind it is turquoise, which matches the water in the print.

To the right is the kitchen, where the next thing you notice is the clay pot-colored wall, and where it meets the soft yellow adjacent wall. That intersection brings your eye to the focal point of the room — a large round wall art hanging with a soft yellow background and clay pot-colored

Also hanging on the wall is a one-of-a-kind wall art — an old door draped with clear Christmas lights.

Above the kitchen are one of Ms. Carlyle’s favorite things to collect — picnic baskets.

The bathrooms are painted leaf green, a very relaxing color. A family member had told her greens are the best colors to use in bathrooms.

Ms. Carlyle loves to rearrange her furniture.

“Nothing stays in the same place for very long,” she said.

She added a white fence around her back porch when she first moved in.

To the left of the entry way, there is what Ms. Carlyle calls her “everything room.” It holds a desk, some arts and crafts, and occasionally, an air bed for when she wants to wake up to different scenery.

In her bedroom, her beds are covered with matching hand-made quilts.

“I absolutely love the idea of the unit and complex,” said Ms. Carlyle. “I’m grateful to the city for it, for the chip sealing, and everything they do here. I love my neighbors, as well. This is a very
