Tuesday Telegram day late next week

The newspaper's publisher, Tom Dreiling, said he hopes this doesn't create an inconvenience for any of you. "Thanks for your continued support and allowing us to toss in a few speed bumps during the year," he said.

Tag renewal deadline altered

Although Aug. 31 is the deadline for tag renewals for those with last names starting with the letters "M", "N" and "O", the Norton County Treasurer's office will issue tags without penalty through Tuesday, Sept. 2. The renewal is for automobile, light truck, motorcycle or motorized bike. When renewing, remember to include your current proof of insurance for all vehicles. The office needs to verify the VIN number, policy number and current expiration date. Please keep in mind the office's computers are shut off at 4:30 p.m. daily for balancing.

The treasurer's office can renew regular driver licenses and issue ID cards, and by appointment issue Instructional permits and restricted licenses for those who have completed a Driver's Education course and Out of State transfer license. Applicants will need to bring certified birth certificates, social security cards and parent or guardian with valid DL or ID.

The Norton County Treasurer's office hours are Tuesday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. All CDL licenses have to be renewed at a full service office: Phillipsburg, Hays or

Lunch time preparation quite a job

It took 60 pounds of beef, a case of No. 10 cans of refried beans, a case of picante sauce, 20 pounds of cheese and almost 400 tortillas to make burritos for lunch at Norton's Eisenhower Elementary School

Head chef Ruby Cook said that she and her staff also used 45 pounds of broccoli, 10 pounds of cheese, nine No. 10 cans of applesauce and two 4.5 pound packages of red gelatin to make the cheesy broccoli and rosy applesauce side dishes.
