In September 2007, at the State Archery Shoot near Manhattan, Kansas, I qualified with my Recurve bow to go to the National Archery Shoot in Grand Island, Nebraska, which was held this June. This was very exciting for me, because the Recurve bow is my most favorite thing to shoot. It was also very nice that the National Shoot was close to us this year, and yet I was a little nervous because I would be competing with people my age and older from across the nation.

When I got to Grand Island on Sunday evening, I had to register and check in my equipment. At check in, I was given a number to pin on the back of my shirt, and I had to wear it each day

arts and crafts, fiber arts, foods of competition. Then the officials kill zone on any other part of the checked the poundage draw of my bow, and the weight of my arrows. If all of this is within the rules, then I would be allowed to practice the next day, before the real competition starts.

> I did pass the requirements of check in and was allowed to practice the next day, Monday. On Tuesday, the first day of competition, I was scheduled to shoot at the FITA targets, which are multi-colored rings with a big yellow bull's eye. All of us shot a total of 72 arrows from 60 meters, 50 meters, 40 meters, and 30 meters, plus some practice rounds before we started scoring. This day turned out to be really interesting because it rained the night before, so we had to muck through a lot of mud all day and we were all covered from the knees down, and it felt like we were carrying an extra 10 pounds around on our shoes! I ended up with a score of 265 points for this set of targets.

> On the second day of competition, Wednesday, I was to shoot this set were set up at marked distances. The targets are smaller and have black and white rings going into the center bull's eye. The bull's eye is worth 5 points, the next rings are worth 3 points, and the outside rings are worth 1 point. Sometimes there was more than one target to shoot at each station. We shot a total of 56 arrows and my score was 105 points. This was a new experience for me and I really liked shooting the Field Targets.

The third day of competition, Thursday, everyone, Recurve shooters and Compound bow shooters, shot the 3-D targets. 3-D targets are made to look like real animals, fish, and birds. Although I have shot this kind of target many times before, at National they were scored a little bit different than I was used to. There is a kill zone on each 3-D target, which has a 10 point inner circle and a 5 point circle just outside of the 10 point one. If one of the kill zone circles is hit that is the score received for that target. But if an arrow hits outside the

animal target, a negative 5 score is received. This is the Fred Bear scoring system, and is used to encourage accurate practice for ethical kills if actually hunting. We shot at 30 targets using one arrow per target. This was a lot of fun and I liked it except for the negative scoring. It can be a little frustrating to see your score go from positive to negative to positive. In the end my total score equaled a big fat ZERO, but I'm proud of myself for not ending with a negative score!

National Archery was really a great experience for me. I got to meet a lot of really cool people from other states, Louisiana, Texas, Montana, Georgia, to name a few. And it was almost 4 days of solid shooting, which is HOG HEAVEN for any toxopholite (look it up!). I never placed, but I was really happy with going and being a part of this archery program. A survey has been completed and plans are being finalized to build a Fitness Center on the Colby Community College campus. President Dr. Lynn Kreider has indicated the 80'x 150'steel building will be located between Living Center East and the tennis courts. Total cost of the project, equipment and wrestling mats is approximately \$500,000.
