• Stay alert, always wear your seat belt and drive at a safe, sensible speed for conditions.

• Watch for the reflection of deer eyes and for deer silhouettes on the shoulder of the road.

• Do not rely exclusively on devices such as deer whistles, deer fences and reflectors to deter deer.

• When driving at night, use high-beam headlights when there is no opposing traffic. The high beams will illuminate the eyes of

• Brake firmly when you notice a deer in or near your path, but importantly, stay in your lane. Many serious accident occur when drivers swerve to avoid a deer and hit other vehicles or lose control of their cars. Potentially, you will risk less injury by hitting the deer.

• If the deer stays on the road, stop on the shoulder, put on your hazard lights and wait for the deer to leave the roadway; do not try to go around the deer while it is on the road.

• If you do hit a deer and are damage."

Bombs recovered, three men arrested at Oberlin

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Oberlin police looking for drugs recovered "more than one" bomb from the home of an Oberlin man who is now sitting in the Decatur County Jail, along with two friends, on various drug charges.

Around 3:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon, the Oberlin Police Department arrested Kevin Smith, 34, and Darrel Ferguson, 53, after executing a search warrant at Mr. Ferguson's house at 201 N. Wilson.

DeLane Sauvage, 24, was arrested early Sunday morning, said Chief Wade Lockhart, after another search warrant was executed in the 200 block of West Commercial.

Mr. Smith has been charged with two counts of possession of drug paraphernalia, one count of possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver and within 1,000 feet of a school and one count of failing to have a state drug tax stamp.

Mr. Ferguson has been charged with two counts of possession of drug paraphernalia, one count of possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver and within 1,000 feet of a school, one count of failing to have a drug tax stamp, one count of criminal possession of a firearm and one count of criminal possession of explosives.

Mr. Sauvage was charged with two counts of possession of drug paraphernalia, one count of possession of marijuana and one count of failing to have a drug tax stamp.

On Saturday, said Chief Lockhart, he and his three officers, Troy Haas, Scott Zeigler and Brad Burmaster, along with four

officers from the Kansas Bureau in the house, but didn't elaborate of Investigation, sheriff's Deputy Jay Tate and an officer from Thomas County sheriff's K-9 unit executed the search warrant on Mr. Ferguson's home.

During the search, said Chief Lockhart, they found several bombs, which prompted them to stop searching. He said they called a bomb squad from the state fire marshal's office. He said they don't remove something like that because it's a safety issue.

The department kept control of the house all night, he said, since the bomb squad couldn't make it to Oberlin until Sunday.

Around noon, the five-member bomb team showed up, dressed in pads and helmets, and removed the bombs from the home.

People within a 150 foot radius were asked to leave their homes on Sunday while the squad worked, he said, adding that it was for their own safety.

The men put the bombs in the back of a county dump truck, drove the truck to the county landfill and detonated them, he said.

On Sunday, said Chief Lockhart, the city officers had help from the Decatur County ambulance crew and fire department, the county and the sheriff's office.

Once the bombs were removed, said Chief Lockhart, the search continued in Mr. Ferguson's home. He said they did not find a meth lab

on what was found.

Saturday night, he said, another search warrant was executed in a home on the 200 block of South Cass.

Charges are pending in that case, he said, adding that he couldn't release the names until they are filed.

The three men arrested over the weekend had a first appearance in Decatur County District Court on Monday morning.
