Helicopter takes boy to med center

What began as a fun day of play at grandma and grandpa's house for six-year old Dawson Kempt, Oberlin, ended with a piece of rebar skewered through his chin.

Dawson, the son of Dale Kempt, Oberlin, and Shelby and J.D. Forbes, Oberlin, was playing with his 10-year old brother, Dayton Kempt, at the home of step-grandparents, Dean and June Forbes, Norcatour. Dawson jumped from a brick wall to the ground, impaling himself on a piece of rebar embedded in the ground that is used to hold seasonal

decorations. The rebar is normally completely covered.

The accident happened about 10:30 a.m. Sunday.

When Mrs. Forbes was alerted to the accident by Dayton, she held Dawson still until help could arrive. The rebar extended almost two and a half feet from the ground and Dawson was just barely tall enough to stand up beside it. The rebar entered under his chin, knocked out three of his front teeth and scraped the top of his mouth. His tongue also sustained some injury.

Two Norcatour firemen, Carl Lyon and Troy Wentz, assisted by cutting the rebar

after the Oberlin Emergency Medical Technicians arrived on the scene. They used bolt cutters, cutting the rebar off at ground level to minimize any more injury to the little boy.

Mr. Wentz said, "I've never been on a call like that before and I hope I never see anyone injured like that again."

The Decatur County Ambulance transported Dawson to a helicopter that had landed on the asphalt road connecting Norcatour to U.S. Highway 36. Medical personnel secured the rebar to Dawson's leg for the 38 minute flight to Kearney Medical Center where he underwent surgery.

His maternal grandmother, Chris Walston of Traer, said the surgery was successful and Dawson's breathing tube was removed Monday morning. She said it is possible that he may lose some sense of taste and smell and his speech may be affected. She said he was still heavily sedated. Dawson was expected to be transferred to the pediatric unit in Kearney today. His mother said she hopes he can come home Friday.

Mrs. Forbes said she was so appreciative for all the help from the fire department and the medical personnel. She said, "It turned out good. He's a mighty lucky (Continued on Page 5)

Don't forget to put some sardines on your turkey

Then we're gonna put salt and pepper on it, and we'll leave some of the blood in it for flavoring. Then we're gonna put it on the fire in our backyard. It will cook for about an hour. We'll get our turkey at a grocery store. We will cook it with peanut butter, and mustard, and ketchup and syrup. We'll mix it all in! We cook it in the oven for 2 days at 25 degrees. Then you take it out of the oven and eat it. My mommy, grandma, me and my brother and my dad will eat it! And my sister! — Hannah Baile

People shoot turkey and then we can go to a shop and get one for our dinner. We need to clean the turkey and put salt and pepper on it. Then we put it on the stove for 10 minutes. We'll put the turkey in the refrigerator so we can get it out when

we're ready to eat it. My brother and mom and dad and I will eat it! — Courtney Jones

My dad will shoot a turkey. He will take off all the feathers. We probably need to wash it, then he will put pepper in it, and salt. We will cook it in the oven for maybe 4 minutes at 4 degrees. Then we will eat it! — Riley Meyers

Me and my dad will go hunting for our turkey. We'll look in the corn fields and the woods. My dad will shoot it with a gun and then we'll clean it out. We'll cut it and put it in a bowl in the sink to clean off the feathers so it will be fresh and clean so we can cook it. Sometimes we put applesauce on the turkey. We'll cook it in the oven for 50 seconds on kinda hot. Then we'll put on the applesauce and let it cool. We'll also have pumpkin or apple or pineapple pie with our turkey. — Kiley Chisham

My dad goes hunting and he shoots a turkey. And he brings it home and brings it inside. Then he cuts the turkey and he
