

Operation Christmas Child was founded in 1970 and now has 1856 relay centers from which shoe boxes go to 372 distribution centers and then to six regional areas with 70,000 volunteers involved.

Operation Christmas Child involves filling shoe boxes with personal hygiene items, toys, games, books and/or school supplies for a specific age and gender of child -2 to  $\frac{3}{4}$ , 5 to 9, or 10 to 14 years, boy or girl to be distributed to needy

children around the world.

Last year 7.6 million boxes were distributed around the world; 4.6 million were provided from volunteers in the United States.

Members of Mid-Century displayed the contents of nine shoe boxes they had filled for Operation Christmas Child.

Club member teams had packed three for girls, ages 2 to 4; two for girls ages 1- to 14; two for boys, ages 5 to 9; and two for boys, ages 10 to 14 years.

These were sent, with the needed postage, to the Plainville relay center. In addition to filling the shoe boxes, members were reminded to pray for the children and their families who will receive these boxes.
