Flu shots available at Doctor's Clinic

The Norton County Heath Department no longer has flu shots left. To get a flu shot, go to the Norton Doctor's Clinic. Bring your insurance card or \$25. There are forms to sign and a nurse will administer the shot. People with egg allergies, history of Guillian-Barre Syndrome, or a severe reaction to flu vaccines will not be able to get a flu shot. Also people who have had a fever or not felt well in the 24 hours prior to getting a flu shot will not be able to get one. For questions, call the Doctor's Clinic at 877-3305.

Long wait ends this evening, Santa's due at 6:30

The countdown is underway for kids in Norton County. Santa's House is on the courthouse lawn, just waiting for Santa to make his appearance.

The courthouse lights will be switched on, and kids and parents will be waiting in a line leading up to Santa's hut when he arrives at the courthouse this evening from 6:30 to 8:30.

The Chamber Ambassadors will serve hot chocolate and cookies," said Karla Reed, Norton Area Chamber of Commerce executive director.

Every Thursday evening thereafter, until Dec. 18, Santa will be in his hut, ready to talk to the kids.

He will be there from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m.

"If it gets too cold, Santa will move into the courthouse, or if it's really bad

out, we'll close early," said Ms. Reed. "We've done it before, and we can do it again. Sometimes it's just too cold to be outside, even if its Santa they're waiting to see."

Along with visiting Santa, kids and parents can go on a sleigh ride around the downtown area.

"Don Kaus is pulling the sleigh again this year," said Ms. Reed. "He really seems to enjoy doing it for us."

For those kids too shy (or scared) to see Santa in person, they can write him a letter and put it in the special mailbox outside the chamber office.

The letters will be printed in The Telegram on Dec. 19. The last day the mailbox will be up is Dec. 24.

"Even if a kid doesn't get his letter to Santa in the newspaper, it's okay, we'll still make sure it gets to him," said Ms. Reed.

Firefighters dispatched to grain elevator

A faulty bearing in the Ag Valley Co-Op elevator brought Norton's fire department out late Tuesday evening.

"Due to age and wear and tear, a ball bearing on the belt that moves grain from the 'boot' (the lower part of the elevator) to the 'leg' (the top of the elevator) got hot, and dripped hot metal onto the grain below it, causing the grain to smolder," said Pete Jepsen, Ag Valley Co-Op Safety and Regulatory Director.

An Ag Valley employee checked on everything before leaving for the night and smelled the smoldering grain. He called 911 to report it.

"The grain never did catch fire," said Mr. Jepsen. "That employee and two other employees stayed at the scene while the fire trucks were there."

The call came into dispatch at 7:39 p.m. Three fire trucks were paged at 7:40 p.m. Norton Fire Department truck #15 arrived on the scene at 7:46 p.m. and Norton Fire Department truck #12 arrived at 7:49 p.m. No arrival time for truck #10 was listed.

According to Norton Rural Fire Department Chief Steve Otter, firefighters had to dig all the smoldering grain out of the elevator.

"The Norton Fire Department has toured our facility and are very knowledgeable about it," said Mr. Jepsen. "They didn't use water to put the smoldering grain out. It could have kicked up the grain dust, and possibly made the situation worse. They carried the smoldering grain out in buckets, instead. The fire department did a great job, protecting the facility and the community and its people."

The fire trucks left between 9:46 and 9:49 p.m.
