I turned on CNN and heard there had been a shooting at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Washington. My thoughts suddenly went to our dear friend, Jim, a music professor, at the college, and his wife, the dean of student affairs.

"I'll call later to make sure everything is okay," I thought to myself. Five minutes later the phone rang. It was Judy, Jim's wife, and I knew. A gunman had walked up to Jim and shot him point blank four times. He didn't know Jim and Jim didn't know him, but the gunman had stalked another professor in the music department for 30+ years and decided to shoot the next person who walked out of the music building. It was the gunman's sick attempt to gain the attention of the woman whose life he had impacted. After shooting Jim, he laid down an eight page letter and turned the gun on himself.

After a series of killings on college campuses some schools are advocating and in some cases are allowing students over 21 to carry concealed weapons. I am a firm believer in gun rights, but within reason. College campuses are one

of the safest havens in our country. Your chances of being shot on a campus are 62 out of 100,000 compared to the general population of 462 out of 100,000.

Although we own guns, I am well aware of the dangers of using a gun for self defense. Data suggests the mere presence of a gun in your home raises your chances of being killed or injured.

A major problem facing youth on campus is alcohol usage. Any time one combines alcohol and college students and then factor in a concealed weapon, well, you get the picture. Consider this:

• An estimated 110,000 students between the ages of 18 and 24 are arrested for an alcohol-related violation.

To date this year there have been 13 college students killed on campuses. Between 2000 and 2005, an average of four per year were killed. To be sure there have been increased numbers each year since and it is a problem which needs to be addressed, however a knee jerk reaction is seldom responsible and surely this is one of those cases.

Jim would have been horrified to think his death was an impetus for carrying a weapon. Jim abhorred violence of any kind. He was a hunter and a great proponent of our personal rights, but he also was aware of human frailties. His life was a reflection of peace thus it only seems fitting for his death to be a rallying cry not for concealed weapons but for identifying and treatment of those with mental


