There was no action taken at Monday night's Norton School District board of education meeting regarding the addition of baseball and softball to Norton Community High School sports.

There were no comments from the public when asked, and the school board members discussed the idea among themselves. Board member Scott Ellis said he had heard a lot of positive comments from the public about adding baseball and softball, but that lately, he had also been hearing more negative comments. Board Vice President Jeff Nielsen said he didn't think it would be a good idea to add another extra curricular activity when cuts may have to be made.

Before leaving the room so the board could go into executive meeting, Joe Durham, Norton, one of he patrons who was there to speak to the board about the addition of baseball and softball, asked if he was supposed to speak when the board asked for comments from the public. The board said yes, and Mr. Durham asked about bringing the issue up again before the board. Greg Mann, Norton School agenda again before he could speak with the board about it.

Rich Miller, who was a mediator for the Recreation Commission baseball program and was at the board meeting in support of baseball and softball as a high school sport, said he didn't know if the issue will be brought to the school board again next month.

Also at the board meeting in support of having baseball and softball as a high school extra-curricular activity were Dr. Lamont Shirk, Jake Durham, Rick Green, Denny Nickel and Dr. Richard Peterson.

Superintendent Mann said he received an email from Dale Dennis, Deputy Commissioner of School Finance for the Kansas Department of Education, for cost estimates for repairs and renovations, energy efficiency upgrades and upgrading technology for all Norton school buildings. Mr. Mann said he thinks this adjourned.
