Past tourney medalists honored

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Former Norton Blue Jay state wrestling medal winners from 1959, 1969, 1979, 1989 and 1999 were honored during ceremonies at the J.R. Durham Invitational Wrestling Tournament on Saturday in the Stull Gymnasium in Norton.

Each honored wrestler received a "Certificate of Wrestling Excellence" and congratulatory handshake from Norton Community High School Activities Director Jeff Wallingford.

Current Norton head wrestling coach Bill Johnson began to recognize the "Norton Wrestling Tradition" during his first year in 1992. Since that time, 313 Norton state wrestling medalists have been honored.

Norton's 1939 team placed tenth in the state tournament. Everett Amos Mason placed second from that team at 103 but is deceased.

The Blue Jay 1949 team placed Strevey, first, 165, Omaha, Neb. and Dwight Johnson, third, 154, Minneapolis, Minn. Another medal winner from that team, Harold Waufle, third, 120, is deceased. Their coach Paul Casper is also deceased.

The 1959 Norton wrestling team was the first of six state championship teams coached by J.R. "Jake" Durham. Present from that team was Alvin Bird, Winfield, who was the champion at 154 pounds.

Tom Ankenman, third at 112, Hutchinson, was unable to be present but coach Durham accepted the certificate of excellence for him. Other team medalists who could not be present were: Roger Fisher, champion, 95, Jamestown, N.D. and Ralph Hackney, third, 165, Hays.

The 1979 Blue Jay wrestling team was also coached by Jake Durham and placed second in the state in Class 4A. Kyle Hahn, state champion, 119, Ness City had they been present were: Don accept their awards. Mike Ray, state champion, 132, Springfield, Va., was not present but his certificate was accepted by his niece Amanda Ray. Kurt Hahn, third, 98, Wichita, was not present but Fig Millan accepted his certificate. Mike Jimenez, third, 155, Fresno, Calif., and J.D. Higgason, third, 105, Kansas City, Mo., were unable to be present.

J.B. was present to accept his certificate. Shawn is currently stationed in Iraq and his brother, Ryan O'Toole, accepted his certificate.

This was the 44th annual wrestling tournament held in Norton and the 12th annual Durham tournament. It was renamed 11 years ago in honor of J.R. "Jake" Durham of Norton.

Jake's honors include membership in the National Wrestling Hall of Fame and Kansas High School Wrestling Hall of Fame. Jake and his wife, Ruth, still reside in Norton.

Coach Kevin Jilka's Norton Community High School girls basketball team won a key Mid-Continent League road game on Friday night when they outscored Osborne 55-43.

The Lady Jays got big scoring nights from Laura Lee Baird on the perimeter and Hayli Bozarth inside and played well enough defensively to hold down the Lady Bulldogs' offense.

Baird hit four baskets from long range and ended with 14 points and Bozarth swished 10 baskets in the paint and totaled 26 points for the night.

Norton outscored Osborne 13-7 in the first quarter when Bozarth hit two baskets and two free throws, Baird buried her first trey of the night and Ashlie Stewart and Lacey Wallingford each hit a two-point basket.

The Lady Jays outscored the Lady Bulldogs by just 9-7 in the second quarter but were up 22-14 at intermission. Bozarth put in two more baskets, Baird swished another shot from long range and Taylor Rossi and Stewart each connected on a free throw.

With Bozarth leading the way with four baskets and three charity tosses for 11 points, Norton outscored Osborne 16 to 12 in the third quarter to extend the lead to 38-26. Amanda Ray and Baird each hit a basket and Rossi connected on another charity toss.

Osborne tried to rally in the fourth period as the Lady Bulldogs scored 17 points but the Lady Jays matched them with 17 of their own to maintain the 12 point advantage. Baird hit two more shots from beyond the arc, Wallingford swished two two-point attempts, Rossi connected on two more charity tosses and Bozarth hit two more baskets and a free throw.

"No question, this was a big win for us," said coach Jilka. "Our

The Norton Community High School boys basketball team lost a close game for the second straight time Friday night when they traveled to Osborne for their first Mid-Continent League game of the season and lost 51-50.

On Tuesday in Norton, the Blue Jays battled Oberlin and came within three points of the Red Devils before losing by five.

Friday night, the Blue Jays led after one quarter and were outscored in the second and third quarters before a fourth quarter rally that fell one point short.

Norton has only three returning lettermen, none of whom were starters last season, so the players are gaining experience as they go. At this point in the season, the inexperience is still causing some problems.

"I was very disappointed in how we played in this game," said Norton head coach Doug Reusink.

"We panicked all night on the offensive end and never had any defensive consistency.

"We must get better leadership out of our upper classmen and consistency in our overall play to have a chance to win some ball

games." The Blue Jays outscored the Bulldogs 9-8 in the first quarter. Zac Dreher hit two baskets and a free throw, J.D. Gall buried a three-point shot and Jordan Wahlmeier also hit a charity for
