## Wally Burton appointed to vacant city council seat

Norton Mayor David Corns nominated Wally Burton to finish out the unexpired term of former city councilman Ron Briery at Wednesday night's council meeting. There was no discussion and all council member voted unanimously to accept Mr. Burton onto the city council.

Mayor Corns said this will only be until April, when the election will determine who will sit on the city council.

"All of those interested were very qualified," said Mayor Corns. "I want to thank you all for applying, and I wish Joe Leroux and Tim Bashford the best of luck in the (April) election."

Mr. Burton was sworn into the council, and thanked the mayor for appointing him and the council for voting for him.

Councilwoman Elaine Mann said she will not seek re-election this year, citing personal reasons. "Hopefully, there will be many that jump up to run for election for this seat," said Mrs. Mann.

Here's how the rest of the council meeting went:

Mayor Corns authorized lights being installed at the city building to illuminate the American flag so it can fly at all times; he notified the council that there will be a retirement party for Head Librarian Kay LeBeau on Feb. 10 from 2 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., and thanked her for her 33 years of service; and also of the International Motor Contest Association awards on Saturday at 4 p.m. at O'Brien's.

Norton City/County Economic Development Director Diane Becker delivered her semi-annual report. She said under the Neighborhood Revitalization Plan, economic development had received 12 applications, 8 of which were approved; told the council about the Demolition Program which offers \$2,000 to cities to help with demolition costs; the Store-Front Renewal Project, which will pay 50 percent up to \$1,000 to upgrade store fronts; and asked the mayor to sign a proclamation designating Feb. 1 through 7 as Buy Local Week.

"There will be in-store special promotions and a scavenger hunt," said Miss Becker.

Tim Bashford asked Miss Becker how the Moffet Station project is coming along. Miss Becker said they are waiting to hear back on a grant, and should know on Feb. 6 whether it was awarded or not, and that R.W. Yeager has made a beautiful stained-glass piece to hang inside the station when it opens.

Councilwoman Mann noted that the report included all the projects economic development has considered, not just the ones that have succeeded, and she urged everyone to read the report.

"It's a very good report," said Mayor Corns. "It's amazing, all the projects, not just in Norton, but in other towns [in Norton County] as well."

In City Administrator Rob Lawson's report, he asked the council for a utilities committee meeting to discuss the rates and loan of the water utility fund.

He also told the council:

The Washington Street sewer plant lift station's lifts are in and will be replaced, using the revolving loan fund to pay for it, and he will meet with engineers today to discuss sludge thickeners and a belt

press for the sewer plant.

He received a letter from BRB Construction on a proposal for the waste water plant lift station. One pump has been upgraded, it had seal failure but was still running. Mr. Lawson said the problem was that the pumps were Myers brand, and could be replaced with Flyght brand pumps. He said the cost would be \$40,000 to upgrade the pumps, and that BRB Construction would cover half that cost if the city decides to replace the pumps. Mr. Lawson said the Flyght pumps were in the original and approved plan.

Councilwoman Mann asked if he knows of other experiences with other sewer plants and the pump brands. Mr. Lawson said no, but that the controls that run the pumps were designed to work with the Flyght brand, and that only two pumps will be replaced, and one will be on standby. Mr. Lawson said he recommends approving the replacements, and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment approves of the move. The city did approve the change.

## Talent show on Almena calendar

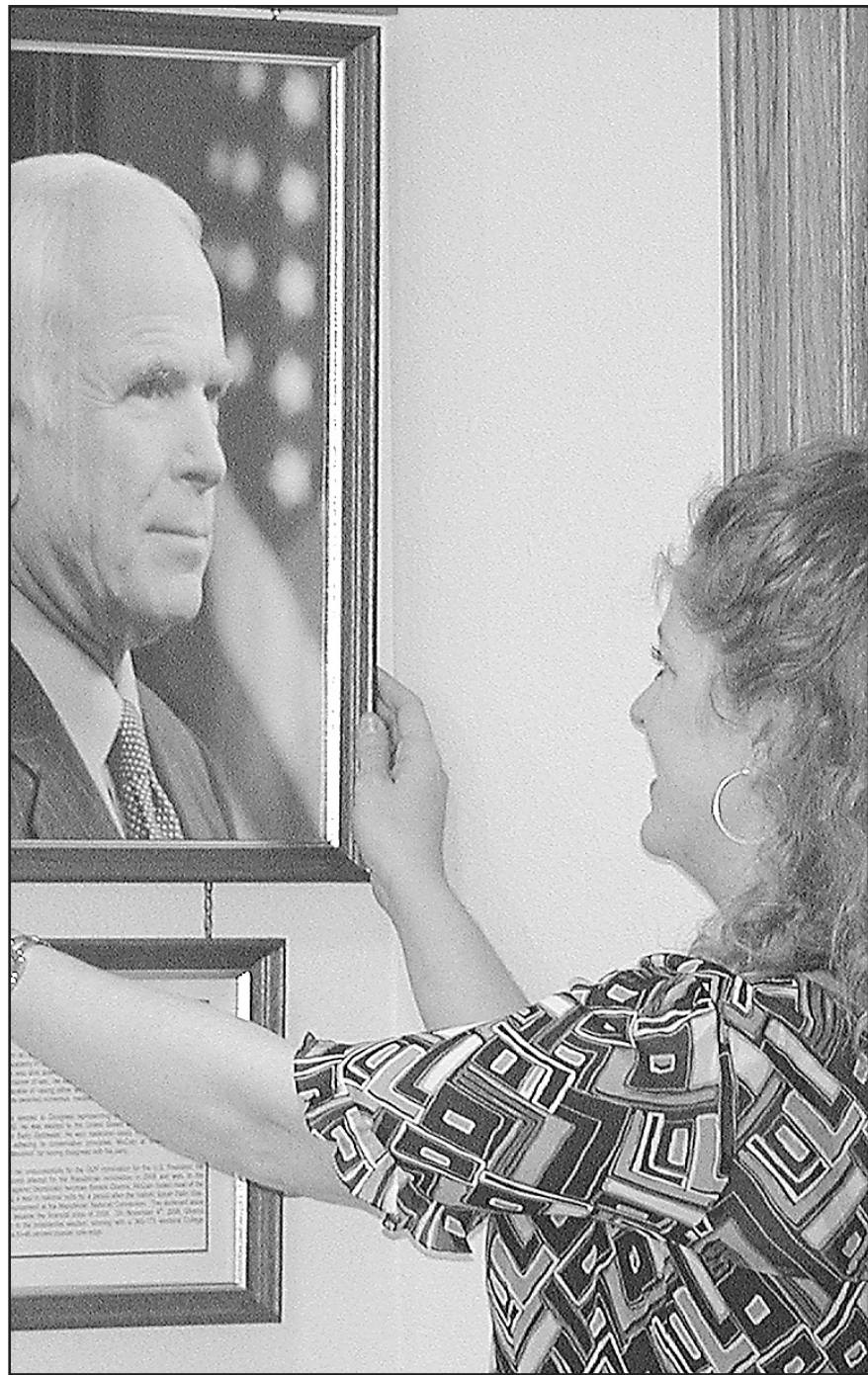
