Ralph Ward Strayer

Feb. 20, 1919 - Jan. 12, 2009

Ralph Ward Strayer died on Jan. 12, 2009, at the Good Samaritan Center in Atwood. He was 89.

He was born on Feb. 20, 1919, on the family farm north of Reager, a town that was named for his great grandfather, Will Reager. He was the sixth of seven children born to Norman and Laura Ward Strayer. He attended Hardscrabble Rural Grade School north of Reager and graduated from Norcatgur Rural High School.

He worked on his parents ffarm until World War II, when he was inducted into the United States Army on May 18, 1944. He was with the 656th Tank Destroyer Battalion and served in France, Belgium and Germany and was in action at the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium and in front line combat in Germany. His Battalion was among the first units to cross the Rhine River at Remagen Bridge. They were headed toward Berlin when the war in Europe ended. He was honorably discharged on April 25, 1946, and was in the United States Navy Reserve from February, 1950, to May, 1954.

On Dec. 9, 1945, he was united in marriage to Evelyn Skrdlant, at her parents home in Norton. He was in the retail lumber business for 38 years, training in Norton and managing lumber yards in Frederick and Arriba, Colo., and in Atwood, for Foster Lumber Company. For 19 of those years, he and his wife owned and operated Home Lumber Company in Atwood until he retired in January of 1985.

His hobbies were woodworking, golf and traveling. He was a member of the American Legion for more than 69 years and past commander of the American Legion Sam Hubbard Post #46 in Atwood. He was a past member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Norton, Colby and Herndon. Ralph was a former member of the International Order of Odd Fellows Lodge in Norton. He was a former member of the Lions Club in Frederick and Arriba and a former member and past president of the Atwood Lions Club for 30 years. He also served on the City Council in Atwood. Ralph was a

member of the United Methodist Church and Methodist Men in Atwood.

He is survived by his wife Evelyn, in the Good Samaritan Center in Atwood; daughters Joyce Hicks and Janice Strayer, Denver; Carla and husband, Larry Chvatal, San Diego; grandson Mark Hicks and wife, Stephanie, Denver; sister, Gladys Taylor, Salina; sister-in-law Ruby (Guy) Strayer, Norton; and nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents; two sisters, Ferne Strayer and Ivalee Ervin; three brothers, Guy, Carl and Francis; niece Linda Strayer; brothers-in-law Ray Ervin and Jesse Taylor; and sister-in-law Ruby (Carl) Strayer.

Couple plans vow exchange

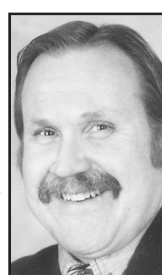

Thirty days prior to March 1 is an important date for landowners and tenants. Landowners and tenants will want to pay particular attention to Farm Lease Laws as a critical date of notice. If you have a need to terminate an oral or written lease to a tenant there is a date upcoming that is important. This **does not** apply to written leases that have tenancy dates specified

in writing! This applies to pasture and cropland leases as well the Kansas Legislature has included the addition of pasture lease also. For oral or written leases where a date is not specified, you as a land owner must give notice to terminate as follows:

- Notice must be in writing
- It must be delivered at least 30 days prior to March 1
- It must fix the termination date of tenancy to take place on March 1

If a fall seeded crop such as wheat has been planted already, then the termination will be set on the day following the last day of harvest or August 1, which ever comes first. Oral agreements are

sometimes vague if a disagreement arises. In fact, oral lease agreements are usually only enforceable for one year. It is best to put together something in writing to protect each party and avoid misunderstandings. K-State Research and Extension has example




