Army placed second as a team in the 40th annual New York State Wrestling Championships in Oswego, N.Y. on Friday, Jan. 16.

Michael finished runner-up at 285. He started the tournament with a 15-0 technical fall in 4:10 over NYU's Mark Shirland and a 5-2 decision over Cornell's Taylor Moore to reach the semi-finals. Following a 3-2 decision over Ithaca's Joe Goetz, Sprigg lost a 5-3 decision in the championship match to Colombia's Ryan

Flores. Michael also placed third in the same tournament his freshman year when he finished with a 16-18 overall record and received honorable mention freshman All-

American recognition. Most recently, Army defeated Brown 21-16 and Harvard 30-11 in duals on January 25. Michael won both of his matches. He won an 11-3 major decision over Zach Zdrada, Brown, and decisioned Spencer DeSena, Harvard, 7-3.
