Northern Valley secretary resigns

The resignation of the Northern Valley School District's middle school secretary, Emily Lowry, was accepted by the board of education on a 6-0 vote at the board's monthly meeting Feb. 9 at the Almena School.

The secretary will remain on the job until the end of the current school year.

The decision to accept the resignation came after an executive session under Personnel Review dealing with matters for nonelected personnel.

Later in the evening, the board

went into another executive session under Board/Administration/Policy Evaluation for the purpose of discussing personnel matters for non-elected personnel. No action was taken when the board returned to open session.

During the meeting, Superintendent George Griffith informed the board that he needed to republish the 2008-09 budget for the general fund. A motion and a second to this need was approved 6-0. The superintendent talked to the board about expected state

funding budget cuts.

Chris Robertson, preK-8 principal, shared information on a Kansas Masons Child ID program. She said the Masons would purchase the equipment to implement the program, but it would be at the discretion of parents to record their child's data.

The Northern Valley Education Association presented its proposals. but the board opted not to take action at this time until the state budget is finalized.



present. Eva Fuertes, Spanish teacher at Norton Community High School, presented an informative program about Spain. She explained that her country is a

parliamentary monarchy; however, it was a dictatorship prior to 1978. Eva stated there are actually five different languages spoken in Spain. Eva had statistics demonstrating that Spain is a progressive country. It is second in the world in use of wind energy and ranks third in the world based on the number of women in the military. Life expectancy is high with age 86 for women and age 80 for men. She compared and contrasted Spain's public education system to that of the United States. At age fourteen students may

begin to train for a vocation. A public university is basically free or has very little cost to the student. Extracurricular activities are not part of public education.

President Lynn Hehn called the business meeting to order. The minutes were read and approved. The treasurer's report was given. The upcoming state convention was discussed.
