'B' tag renewal deadline March 31

March 31 is the last day to re-new vehicle tags if your last name begins with "B" or your business name begins with "B". Remember to bring proof of insurance on each vehicle. Vehicle business is done from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily at the office of the Norton County Treasurer in the court-house.

Driver's license renewals can also be processed Tuesday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Remember to bring along your social security card or something that has your social security number on it for verification. Instructional permits and Driver Education restricted licenses can be processed in the office by appointment. You will need to bring a certified birth certificate, social security card and a utility bill with current address plus the driver license's of the parent that brings the child.

If you have questions, please call the office at (785) 877-5795. All commercial driver's license renewals need to be renewed at a full service station in Phillipsburg, Hays or Colby.

Brakes put on wind energy push locally

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Wind energy was a topic of discussion at Wednesday night's Norton City Council meeting. Councilwoman Elaine Mann said at the last Utilities Committee meeting, Diane Becker, Norton City/County Economic Development director, discussed wind energy within the city limits.

Mrs. Mann said the committee looked over Norton's city ordinances, and did not find anything that did not allow wind turbines within the city limits; however, Mrs. Mann said she did not feel having wind turbines in the city is in the best interests of Norton.

She asked City Attorney Karen Griffiths to draw up a sample ordinance for the committee to review. Mrs. Griffiths said there is no zoning for wind turbines now, and if zoning laws need to be changed, it has to go before the zoning commission.

Councilman Toby Kuhn said he thought the city of Hays had looked into having wind turbines within the city, but he wasn't sure what they had ultimately decided to do.

City Administrator Rob Lawson said there are a lot of legalities to be considered before having wind turbines in the city.

Mrs. Mann invited everyone to the next Utilities Committee meeting (the time and date have yet to be determined). She said the legalities of wind turbines in Norton need to be clarified before they become an issue. Mrs. Griffiths said she would gather ordinances from other cities and bring them to the committee meeting.

In other city council business:

- Police Chief Pat Morel said Officer Larry Land's last day will be March 31. Mr. Land filled the open sheriff's deputy position. Mrs. Foley asked how long Mr. Land had been with the police department. Chief Morel said about two years.

- Mr. Lawson introduced Dan Sisk, the new lineman for the city. Mr. Lawson said Mr. Sisk was the best person for the job, and thought he would be a good fit.

- Mrs. Mann said at the Utilities Committee meeting, Miss Becker presented information on what incentives the city offers new businesses in Norton. Mrs. Mann said the Heaton building at 111, 112 and 113 South State Street, where The Sewing Box and K & S Center used

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Football and baseball fields suffer damage

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Northern Valley School District officials report damage to the football field and baseball fields at Alema on March 5.

No identification has yet been made, but whoever they were drove onto the fields in question, leaving three large circular "donuts" in the turf, covering about a quarter of the fields.

"Vandalism is not acceptable at any time," said George Griffith, superintendent of Northern Valley Schools and also high school principal. "Repairing the damage from these types of acts of disrespect is far more difficult in these tough financial times."

Mr. Griffith said he is not sure how much it will cost to repair the damage to the fields yet.

A reward of \$100 is being offered for information leading to the conviction of whoever is responsible for the damage.

"We hope to find the individuals responsible for doing damage to the Huskies' fields," said Mr. Griffith.

Norton County Sheriff Troy Thomson said, "At this point, we have received tips, and we are looking into them. We are interviewing persons of interest."
