Did I mention term limits?

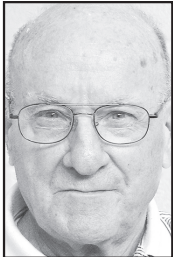

- All letters hand delivered or sent by regular mail, must have a signature (typed names alone won't work).
- All letters must contain the name of the town of the writer (or if out in the country please use rural Norton, rural Almena, etc., etc.).
- All letters must contain a daytime telephone number (this is necessary for us to verify the letter we received was from the person whose name is attached).

These are all necessary for your protection and ours. On occasion we will receive a letter addressing a local issue

and in our quest to get it verified, will learn the writer used someone else's name.

Please keep letters short and to the point. The longer the letter, the less interest it generates. We will check your letter for typing errors, but will not fool with its content, because doing so we might alter your meaning.

Letters that demean one's character, or use unsubstantiated allegations (rumors), will go directly into 'file 13.' That is where unsigned letters also end up.

E-mail letters are easy and quick to verify, but should also contain name of town and daytime telephone number.
