Dancers to perform 'Blast to the Past'

The music will range from the 1950's to current, and the students will perform jazz, tap and ballet dances for the audience. "All the dancers are well-prepared and excited," said Chanda Bush, owner and operator

of Chanda's Dance Illusions. "They want to show people what they have learned."

Mrs. Bush has been dancing for about 30 years, has been an instructor for 15 years, and has owned her own dance studio for 10 years. This is her first year teaching dance in Norton.

The dancers, ranging in ages from 3 to 18, have been practicing for the recital since September. All of the moves are original moves. There is even a boy in the tap class.

"I usually do have boys in my classes," said Mrs. Bush. "The dance classes are good for them because the stretches and moves make them more limber, and that reduces sports injuries."

Mrs. Bush said she chose the "Blast to the Past" theme be-

cause of the 50's music.

"The music in that era is pure, and is the base of what music is today," she said. "Since most of my dancers are beginners, they need to start at the beginning."

Ballet is a requirement in the dance classes, because, according to Mrs. Bush, "Ballet is the basic of dance."

Mrs. Bush said along with teaching dancing skills, she hopes to be able to teach students self-esteem, self-respect and self-discipline.

"Every little girl or boy deserves a chance to dance," said Mrs. Bush. "I'm willing to work with parents on the dance tuition. Dance is a life-long pursuit, and you never know who is going to be the next big star."

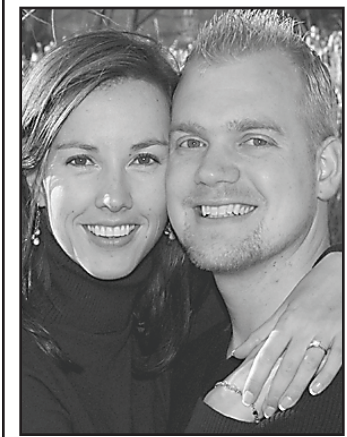
Getting a facelift
