Library Station, Norton KS 67654. These are done by mail only and no handbacks can be done at the post office. Everyone knows that the post office

cancels stamps with a cancellation device. Usually it's a circle with the town name, date of cancel, and Zip Code. A pictorial cancel also has that information but also contains a picture or other graphic to celebrate a special event.

Most people have never heard of these pictorial cancels but they are quite common and the post offices has been offering this service for several years. It's a great way to let your friends and relatives share in an event by sending them a card or letter with the special cancel on the letter.
