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
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Let's talk about The Star-Spangled Banner

othing upsets me more than to listen to people literally butcher our national anthem. Again this past Fourth of July weekend I was angered. The performer on one of the televised holiday programs, this one in Washington, D.C., took liberties with The Star-Spangled Banner to the max! Had I not been tuned in when the performer began her version of this most cherished song, I would never have guessed what she was singing. As the television cameras panned the crowd, you could see disappointment on the faces of many.

Sadly, as the anthem nears it's conclusion, performers are often nudged on by the crowd to reach for notes few are able to adequately achieve. And the particular performer last Saturday night went beyond even that and this untrained ear heard notes that sounded just a bit off key. Word repetition was common throughout. Granted, her much acclaimed style allows for these 'freedoms' but I would only hope when something as beautiful and as graciously written as our national anthem is sung, she and others of that talent would consider tossing aside the 'freedoms' and stick to the song as it was intended to be performed.

If you want to hear the real The Star-Spangled Banner, listen to a military band and chorus — it'll send chills up your spine.

The words to the national anthem were written by Francis Scott Key in 1814 as a poem, and the tune adopted later came from a well known British song, the work of composer John Stafford.

The Star-Spangled Banner didn't become our national anthem until Congress acted to do so in 1931.

We all know the words to the first stanza. But many people probably don't know there are three others. So, as you keep the tune in your head, here are the words to the four stanzas of our national

O! say can you see by the dawn's early light

What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming?
