Train, tractor probe concludes

ebradley@nwkansas.com The Norton County Sheriff's investigation into the accident between a Kyle Railroad train and a Wildlife and Parks tractor came to an end, with the sheriff saying it was an accident.

"The tractor was attempting to cross the tracks when the oncoming train hit the front loader of the tractor," Sheriff Thomson said.

He said the noise from the tractor prevented driver Bernie Bowen from hearing the train's whistle.

Jacob Dougherty, Kyle Railroad engineer, told the sheriff's department that the train was going 30 miles per hour and blew the horn before entering the intersection. He said the tractor had already entered the intersection.

Mr. Bowen was cited for not stopping, but the sheriff declined issuing a ticket.

Pigskin Pick-Em Animal cruelty laws back on agenda

City laws regarding animal cruelty are up for discussion at today's public safety meeting and at Wednesday's city council meeting. The issue has been brought up at past council meetings by Roxanne Kent, who is asking the city to change its animal cruelty laws.

Ms. Kent wants to see the city adopt the city of Lawrence's code. She is specifically asking that Norton change its laws regarding animals left in vehicles during warm months

The specific code Mrs. Kent wants adopted states, "to leave any animal confined in a vehicle for more than five minutes in extreme weather conditions, defined as less than 30 degrees or more

than 80 degrees."

Ms. Kent said she wants Norton to adopt an ordinance for animals left in a vehicle in 70 degree temperatures.

"Our city code is very limited. I believe it should be in our animal cruelty laws,"

Sherry Hickman, animal control officer, said Norton has laws against animal abuse and neglect. She said the laws cover all abuse and neglect without specifying Mrs. Hickman said each situation

should be looked at on a case-by-case basis because each situation is different.

"Each case should be dealt with individually," she said.

She said some people take their pets with them everywhere, not realizing the danger when leaving the pet in a vehicle.

It is not intentional abuse.

Mrs. Hickman said animal abuse reports can be reported to the police department or animal control.

Aaron White, veterinarian, agreed that

it is a case-by-case basis due to weather elements as well the breed of dog, but they should not be left in a heated vehicle for long.

"If you wouldn't leave your child in the car, you shouldn't leave your dog in the car," he said.

He said a dog definitely shouldn't be left in a car above 80 degrees.

The city council meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday at the City Building.

"It needs to be addressed. I won't let a dog die," Mrs. Kent told the council.

Accident claims Densmore man in Logan area

A fatal accident occurred on K-9, approximately five miles west of Logan Sunday morning.

According to the Kansas Highway Patrol, Glen Walters, 34, Densmore, was driving a 2007 Dodge Ram when it went off the road and into the south ditch, struck a driveway entrance causing the vehicle to go airborne and rolled a couple of times.

The vehicle came to a rest on the roadway, facing southeast.

Mr. Walters was ejected from the drivers seat, and he was not wearing his seat

The Norton County Sheriff's Office received the report at 5:21 a.m. In a statement to The Telegram, the report said that Mr. Walters was taken to Norton County Hospital by Phillips County ambulance. He was pronounced dead at the hospital.
