



Local colleges sign agreements with Fort Hays State University

Elementary education majors who begin their education at Colby and Garden City community colleges will now be able to make a seamless transfer to Fort Hays State University to continue their education after the two colleges signed 2-plus-2 agreements with Fort Hays State University this fall.

Because there is such a shortage of elementary teachers today, this signing is a great way to make the path towards a degree simpler and clearer, allowing more individuals to complete their education and seek licensure in Kansas.

According to Dr. Germaine Taggart, chair of the Department

of Teacher Education at Fort Hays State University, the partnership will enable those who are seeking degrees in the areas of elementary education and early childhood education to make an easier transfer.

Community college representatives have met with Fort Hays State University for several years to discuss programs and procedures that would aid students in their transition to the school.

These discussions resulted in the 2-plus-2 agreements with Kansas' community colleges, the most recent being the two with Colby Community College and Garden City Community

College.

This agreement allows community college students who are working towards an associate degree to know exactly what classes are needed at the community college and at Fort Hays State University to eventually earn a bachelor's degree.

Both the elementary education and early childhood unified teaching degrees are offered online, in class or a combination of both.

Hopeful teachers can take classes that work around their busy schedules, suit their needs and give them hands-on experience in the teaching field.

Beech Memorial cash awards are: \$175 for first place; \$125 for second place; \$100 for third place and \$50 for two honorable mentions.

Contest rules are simple: Stories should have taken place in Kansas in earlier days, be limited to 750 words, be true and unpublished.

The contest is open to anyone, and only one story may be entered per person.

A panel of judges from the Kansas State Historical Society will judge the stories.

Entries must be received by Nov. 27.

Only winning entries will be contacted by the Native Sons and Daughters of Kansas.

Winners will be recognized at the Native Sons and Daughters Annual Banquet set for Jan. 29, 2010, at Maner Conference Center in the Kansas Expocentre in Topeka.

The Banquet is open to all who wish to join for an evening of honoring and celebrating the Great State of Kansas.

Distinguished Kansans will also be honored at the event.

She said the fire marshall said the fire was caused by an electric wire inside the wall in the bathroom.

"It could have been smoldering for months or it could have malfunctioned," she said.

The Untersehers had been trying to sell their home so they could move to Norton. The home was going to be listed with a realtor late this week. They are not sure what they will do now.

"I was concerned with all of the details and rules and regulations that are to be followed and maintained. I am proud to say that we had another clean audit and the budget was followed and that there were no amendments that had to be made in order to comply," he said.

"I feel that is a major achievement when you consider all of the uncertainty and unknown factors involved with the big water and waste water projects that the city has been working on," he said.

Lawson said he is happy the council has gotten more involved in the budget.

"I feel that it is better if we are all working toward the same goals, and that we all understand that we are working for the citizens of the community and the community as a whole," he said.

Lawson said the city's daily operations are being met, and the city is moving in a positive direction.

"We have progressed into a very active community with a lot to offer our residents, both young and elderly alike," Lawson said.

"I am looking forward to serving this community in the future, and meeting the challenges and demands that are introduced to

us by this ever changing world that we all live in. It has been a pleasure serving as your administrator for the last eight years, and I look forward to many more great years," he said.

Lawson asked each council member to give their individual assessment of him. Each council member said they wanted better communication.

Kim Snyder wanted more communication because she felt a lot of things were dropped on them in the last year. Toby Kuhn said he wanted consistency from Lawson.

"This has been a very trying year," he said.

Jeff Otter discussed the council needing to listen better but would like deadlines from Lawson.

"I work for you," Lawson said.

Mayor David Corns said the council needs to ask questions if they don't understand something, saying he and Lawson communicate well.

In other commission business:

- Lawson said a \$1,000 donation has been made to parks. He also reported on the revenue loss, saying information has been handed out to the council.
- Lawson said he received a complaint from Norton County

Sheriff Troy Thomson regarding the letterhead used by the municipal court. He said it looks like a scam, although it is not, and asked the council to consider the issue.

- Diane Stiles, Norton City/County Economic Development director, was present to ask the council to write letters of support for the Dr. Lyons House for a grant application.
- A motion was made to have all donation requests go through the council. Vote taken, motion passed.
- The council went into executive session three times, returning to an open meeting at 7:02 p.m.
- Vacancies on the housing authority, planning and travel and tourism boards were discussed. A motion was made to advertise for the vacant positions. Vote taken, motion passed.

All meetings are held in the city building and are open to the public.
