A SPECIAL TRIBUTE TO JOHN DIEDERICH

Family gets soldier's letter 33 years later

This is the fourth in a four-part series about servicemen killed in the line of duty.

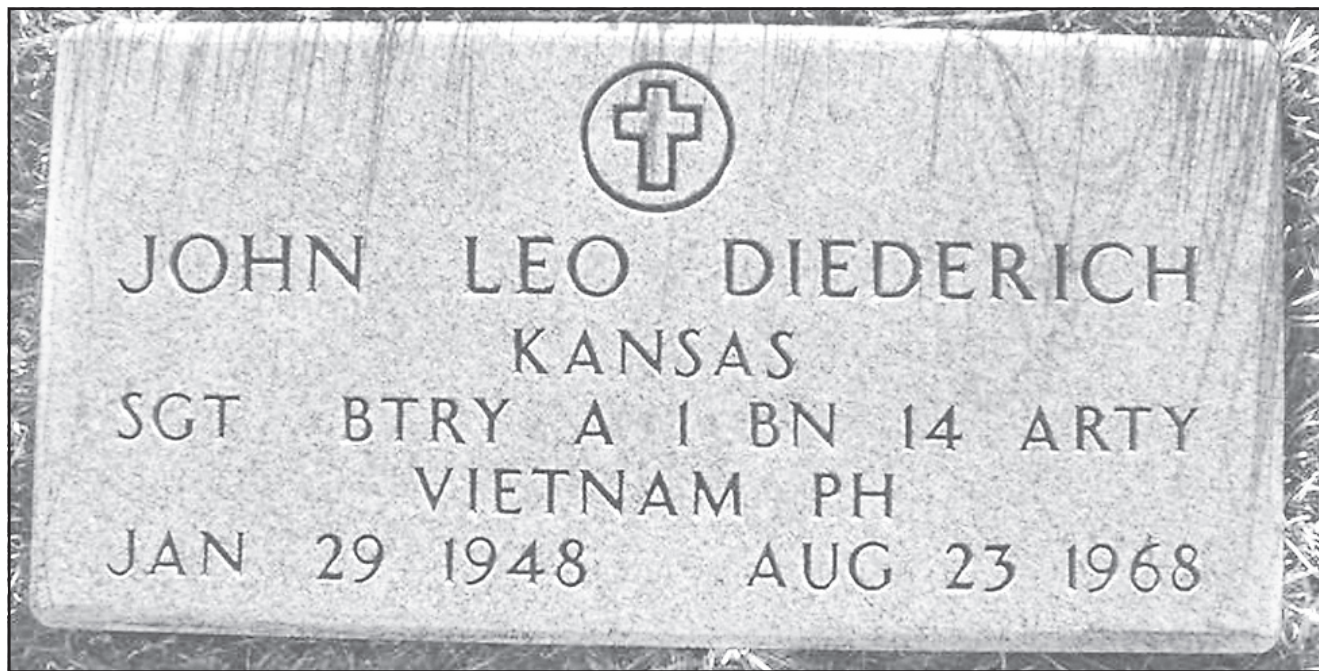
Like lots of farm boys during the 1960s, John Diederich wanted to do his patriotic duty. The country was at war and he volunteered. Like four of his five brothers before him, John served his country. His brother, Tom Diederich, Lenora, said, "I had just gotten back from Vietnam and before I could even talk to John he had volunteered. He wanted to get it out of the road."

John graduated from Leoville High School in 1966 and that fall he enlisted in the U.S. Army. He was trained to maintain and service power generation equipment. John had considered making the Army his career.

In September of 1967, he spent his furlough at home before leaving for Vietnam. His sister, Virginia Rome, said before her brother left for war, he had shared some of his thoughts with her. He had told her, "With the type of training I've had, (intensive, jungle fighting, etc.) I don't think I'll be coming home."

His premonition proved correct. On Aug. 23, 1968, with only a few weeks left on his tour of duty, John Leo Diederich, 20, who had already re-enlisted for additional years in the Army, was killed when an enemy rocket struck his bunker.

Thirty-three years later the family received a letter from one of John's Army buddies, David Porter. Mr. Porter wrote,

"I apologize for waiting so long to write this letter. I was a member of Battery A with your brother. I heard from Nick Zeiler (another of John's buddies) after I returned to the States. He said he had stopped by and visited your family. I wish I had as well.

"I remember Aug. 22 and 23, 1968, very well. For years, those events replayed in my mind most every night. John came to my gun section the morning of the 22nd and asked if I would like to go get a haircut with him. We had



moved to firebase Dottie on July 3 and John had found a couple of real barbers, one just outside the gate to our firebase

and one in a local village. I grabbed my gear and off we went. I recall we were

Road and Bridge head nearly sacked at meeting

Norton County Commissioners discussed the performance of the County Road and Bridge Department with Supervisor Tom Brannan during their September 13 meeting. Chairman Richard Thompson presided with Commissioners John Miller and Carolyn Applegate and County Clerk Robert D. Wyatt present.

Commissioners spoke to Brannan about time management and the importance of getting request jobs completed. Commissioners asked him to deliver a schedule of planned maintenance for requested work on the books, and outlined the importance of getting organized and completing jobs rather

than delaying them.

Following a lengthy discussion of the department and its performance, Commissioner Miller moved to terminate Brannan's employment. After more discussion Commissioner Applegate suggested Brannan submit a plan of management prior to a second on the motion. The motion died for lack of a second.

Brannan also reported on the scheduled road maintenance with mowing a priority for the week.

In other business, the commissioners asked Sheriff Troy Thomson to get bids from local vendors to purchase a new
