She said, "I know there will always be war. I know men always will fight. But I cannot accept war. No mother can.

No mother can think about war, whether the mother is Vietnamese, Communist, American or whatever... no mother can think of war and not think of her son. Have you ever imagined what it would be like without war? I just cannot accept the killing.

Years later Mrs. Eckhart said she still Mrs. Eckhart flew has no use for the Vietnam War. She just can't understand the killing.

While the Eckharts had another son, was joined by her Raymond, she said he died at a young age. Her husband, Floyd, died in 1959.

Lance Cpl. Eckhart could have asked for a deferment as a sole surviving son, said Mrs. Eckhart in an article after her son's death, but he knew he had to go; it was the right thing to do.

Funeral services were held for him at the United Methodist Church in Norcatur bing sleep in between on June 2 with the Rev. J.O. Baumgartner officiating. Escorting the body home from New York was Marine Cpl. George R. Hedrick. Burial was in the Norcatur Cemetery.

## Voice system 'best ever,' says Eisenhower teacher

The USD 211 Board of Education had their regular meeting on Sept. 14 where the new school year was the main topic of business.

Gail Roy, Kindergarten teacher at Eisenhower Elementary, demonstrated the Classroom Amplification system that was recently purchased for the Early Childhood, Kindergarten and First Grade classrooms.

"In my 20 years of teaching, this is the best thing I have ever used." said Roy. "I love it, thank you."

The amplification system allows the teacher to be heard by all the children in the classroom. The rooms were selected as a pilot program as there is critical importance of hearing correct phonetic sounds and pronunciations that directly affect the learning of reading. The sys-

tems were purchased by Title I ARRA

funds.

The board approved the purchase of amplification units for all Eisenhower Elementary classrooms, physical education and the library as well as microphones for itinerant teachers using available Title I ARRA funds.
