Program aims to teach safety while driving around trucks

The Kansas Highway Patrol announced participation in a new program which is designed to help keep teens and other motorists safe when they are traveling around large trucks. Aside from Arizona, the state in which the program was developed, Kansas is one of the first states in the nation to fully sign on in support of the Teens and Trucks program. The Kansas Motor Carriers Association is joining the Patrol in support of this valuable program.

The Teens and Trucks Program was created through a partnership between the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance, Arizona Trucking Association, Arizona Department of Public Safety, and the American Trucking Association. The program was developed in 2009 to help educate teens about safe driving practices around commercial motor vehicles. Materials that support the program are provided free of charge through a federally-funded grant by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration. Included are an instructor’s manual, student workbook, and video.

“Too many young Kansas teenagers are injured or killed in traffic

crashes because of inexperience. They haven’t had nearly as much time as the rest of us to learn how to share the road safely, and responsibly,” said Colonel Terry Maple, Superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol. “By implementing the Teens and Trucks program in our safety presentations, and by Driver’s Education programs incorporating it into their curriculum, our goal is to reduce crashes and save lives, and help produce young drivers more capable of making safe choices on the road.”

The Teens and Trucks program will give Kansas Highway Patrol Public Resource Officers (PROs) another tool to educate young drivers with. The PROs can use the training module in their presentations at schools, civic clubs, and public events they attend.

The Teens and Trucks program addresses safe driving habits such as: Don’t cut off trucks, stay out of blind spots or No Zones, maintain a safe following distance, understand trucks make wide turns and if your car breaks down, pull off the highway as far as you can on the right shoulder of the road.

At the time I am writing this article, the Vietnam Veteran’s Moving Wall will be in Norton, the 110th Ordinance Battalion will be celebrating their 49th year of activation, and those of us who live in Norton have the opportunity to appreciate our country and show our patriotism.

It was Sept. 5 that residents from the Andbe Home reminded me about patriotism. It was the Deployment Parade for the four young people from our county that would be going to Kuwait. It was my weekend to work so I planned to take residents that wanted to go. Lavonia Snodgrass was the first one I asked because her step grandson is Tim Bashford, one of the young men being deployed. She wanted to wish him well so there was one spot on Miss Daisy taken. I thought to myself, “Wasn’t that nice that she wanted to go?” Then I asked Katherine Severns and her reply was, “We should all support our soldiers.” It was the most matter of fact statement I had ever heard and the second seat was taken.

Others accepting the invitation were Lois Dietz, Keith Murphy,

Alvin Smith, Oran and Laverne Milner, Esther Tweed, Evelyn Lyon and John Sawdon. I was pleased when they answered so positively to going. Terry Lyon and his wife Barb were visiting his mother, Evelyn Lyon, that day and they accepted the invitation to be the volunteers on the trip.

With everyone loaded, Miss Daisy proceeded to Elmwood Park to see the soldiers getting organized. The antique race cars were on exhibit so we looked at them. I drove slowly back through the park and looked with interest at the group gathering for the Deployment Parade. I decided to park at the new hat and boot shop south of the Hospital. I was ready to unload residents but they wanted to stay in Miss Daisy with just the windows open. There was a little time to spare so we reminisced about how the various wars affected them.

Bob Sawdon, Keith Murphy and Oran Milner were all veterans and it was like they were so proud to have served in America’s armed forces. Keith said, “It wasn’t always easy, but you did it.” Bob explained that the farther away your life gets from when you served, the memories become more meaningful. Oran chimed in that “Serving

you country was expected and he was glad to serve.”

Katherine’s husband Dale was in the Army as was Lois Dietz’s first husband. Lois told about how she received the word that his plane was shot down and how she appreciated her family helping with the funeral arrangement and with her two small children. Evelyn, Esther and Lavonia’s husbands were farmers and were not drafted but felt what they did on the home front helped with the war effort.

Alvin Smith was not drafted. It was a good thing that the soldiers were coming up the street just a little way from Miss Daisy because I was getting emotional. To me there was so much patriotism in Miss Daisy that day and may never be experienced by the generations to come.

We waved, shouted, and clapped as the soldiers went by. I wiped tears from my eyes as one of the young men shouted, “Thank you for coming!” I couldn’t say but should have said, “Thank you for going.”
