What kind of a day was it, well they were shivering outside but it was plenty warn inside as thirty plus two gathered for the November Pitch Tournament. The odds makers were picking the Rangers in five and the Chiefs to win their fifth. The local Gridiron boys were moving right along and hopes were high they would go all the way. The knock game was getting a little noisy, the Muddy River Boys were going over last minute preparations, and the Ladies Coalition was preparing for a victory march just in case things might go their way; while over in the corner, the Witch Doctor was putting a voo doo hex on the whole bunch. Meanwhile the clock on the wall was pointing to the magic hour but there was still one team short when a couple of Pheasant hunters from Nebraska entered through the south door claiming they needed to rest their dogs. Now in seven point Pitch, there is a possible twenty-eight points in a round of four hands and the usual high round score is somewhere in the neighborhood of seventeen-twenty points but a score of 120 after ten rounds will most likely be the winner. When the scores were posed after round one, the Muddy River Boys had taken the honors with only 14 points which indicated there must have been some over biding taking place. The Black Hat Kid and the Red Neck tied with the Ladies from Lyle for round two honors. Meanwhile the Odd Couple, playing together for the first time, found the right combination and captured the honors on round three.

The gong rang to declare a break after round four and as the scores were posted, there was a rush to the scorer's table to assess the situation. The Golden Girls had taken the honors on round four but the Odd Couple, carrying an average of thirteen points a round were in the lead by a narrow margin of only three points. It was early in the game and not much change was expected as the gong rang to start round five. The pushers were at it again, forcing the bids to the maximum. Team Double K took the honors on round five but the Odd Couple, playing solid was still at the top of the leader board. By now the Auctioneer was calling for bids so his partner threw in the high one on round six. The Blue Dawgs could be heard barking across the room so a break was declared after round seven. As the scores were posted, the Red Neck and the Black Hat Kid had taken the honors and scored the first Double of the evening to take the

lead as well.

With only three rounds left, there appeared to be some serious skull sessions taking place during the break. It was obvious those close to the bottom of the board were going to go for broke but those near the top needed to take caution but within limits as a negative score could spell disaster but a failure to bid 'em if they have them could be just as crucial.

As round eight got underway, the bidders seemed more deliberate and an air of caution fell over the room, Lil Abner and Daisy May took the honors on round eight but the lead went to Team Double K as The Odd Couple hit the wall and gave up the lead after three continuous rounds. As round nine began, it appeared to be the makings of a three team race to the finish as only five points separated the top three teams. The crucial ninth round as always, considered the make or break round by many got underway as silence fell over the room. You could almost hear the gritting of teeth as the round was played out and as the scores were posted, Team Double K had taken the honors and posted the second Double of the evening at a most opportune time, giving them a six point lead and the hot seat going into the tenth and final round. All good things come to an end and as the scores were posted at the end of round ten, the Dutchmen had taken the honors but it was too little too late for them, team Double K had held and taken the championship.

Team Double K had been in the hot seat on many occasions so this wasn't a new experience, they took their accolades with dignity and humility and vowed to return to defend their title as "Pitch tournament Champions."
