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Health department will buy mask machine

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Although the Norton County commissioners feel it is still a waste of money, the health departments in this area will purchase a machine to check safety masks for health workers.

The machine, which will cost about \$10,000, will be paid for out of leftover H1N1 money, County Health

Nurse Gina Frack told commissioners on Monday. Frack said she had originally thought the money was coming from Homeland Security. However, she said, since it is from leftover money, it can be used only for specific things such as the machine, which will test the

masks used by health workers and volunteers to protect against the purchase. themselves in case of an emergency, like the flu.

Frack said that her group voted to get the machine because, although some of the group—including Norton – has access to other means of testing the masks, some counties do not.

Some counties either don't have a hospital or don't have a working relationship with a local hospital which allows them to use hospital equipment to test masks, she explained to the commissions on Monday.

'We decided to go ahead and do it," she said. Commissioner John Miller said that he understood the group had voted and that was that but he still was

"I'm not in favor of doing this," he said.

Miller went on to say that he sees too much of such spending in the state budget and feels that much of it is just a waste.

In other business, the commissioners:

Elections and donation on school board agenda

The members of the Board of Education were reminded by Superintendent Greg Mann that they have until noon on Jan. 25 to file for election at the regular meeting of the board on last Monday.

Mann reported that a donation was received from the Knights of Columbus to the be used in Special Education. He asked the board to accept the donation of \$376.66. The board accepted the donation and will use it for the purpose specified by the Knights of Columbus.

Board members were invited to attend the in-service meeting today. Mann also extended an invitation to interested board members that would like to attend a meeting with him and Joe Hurla from 360 Energy Solutions on Feb. 8 at 1 p.m. to go over the report that will be presented to the board on Feb. 14. Robert Wyatt, Steve Berry and Scott Ellis plan on attending.

A presentation from Mr. Hauser, Director of USD 211 Educational Technology, was changed to the February meeting. The revised three year plan was approved by the board.

A chart that contained a survey was presented to the board showing a graph of the number of students who have access to a home computer and have the internet at home. Summary of the graph showed that 84 percent of 2010/2011 students in grades 3-11 have home computers and internet access.

Robert Wyatt was appointed to serve on the calendar committee to help in the development of the 2011-2012 school calendar.

Superintendent Mann distributed the priority grid for Capital Outlay requests and gave a short overview of each project. He asked the grids be returned to him by Feb. 1 so he can compile the rankings for presentation at the February meeting. Superintendent Mann is recommending that no more than \$150,000 be spent from capital outlay funds for projects in fiscal year 2011.

The board went into executive session for the purpose of discussing matters relating to actions adversely or favorable affecting a person as a student. The board returned at 6:45 p.m. No action was taken as a result of the executive session.
