Blue Jay wrestlers take fourth at Newton

nortontelegrm@nwkansas.com Norton Community High School, the smallest school competing in last Friday and Saturday's prestigious 48th annual Newton Wrestling Tournament of Champions in Newton, displayed their wrestling prowess with a solid fourth place finish in the team standings out of 26 teams.

The Newton tournament is considered to be the toughest high school wrestling tournament in the state of Kansas and even included a top Oklahoma team this year.

That Oklahoma high school, Tulsa Union, won the championship with 228.5 points, followed by Derby, 163; Clay Center, 140; Norton, 120.5; Arkansas City, 118.5; Garden City, 109.5; Lawrence, 109; Newton, 103.5; Colby, 97; Emporia, 93; Wichita Heights, 87; Gardner Edgerton, 85; Manhattan, 80; Wichita Northwest, 75.5; McPherson, 73; Hutchinson, 70.5; Dodge City, 68; Mill Valley, 59; Campus, 54.5; Maize, 51.5; Leavenworth, 46.5; Salina South, 39; Liberal, 32; Bishop Carroll, 25; Maize South, 22; Shawnee Mission West, 13.

Norton is the smallest enrollment school to ever win the Newton tournament championship. The Blue Jays won the team title in 2005 and 2006 and did not compete in 2007 due to inclement weather. In 2008 and 2009, Norton finished ninth as a team and in 2010 placed fifth.

Norton's fourth place finish this year is even more amazing when you realize the Blue Jays entered only one-half a team! That's right, Norton only had seven wrestlers competing out of 14 weight classes!

Six of the seven Norton wrestlers placed in the tournament and two competed for individual championships.

Seniors Troy Bainter, 130, and Landon "Tug" Keiswetter, 160, placed runner-up in their weights.

Seniors Billy Broeckelman, 140, and Spencer Shirk, 171, each placed third and sophomore John Risewick, 112, finished in fourth

Sophomore Eli Bozarth, 145, placed seventh.

Freshman Branson Addington, 103, went 2-2 in the tournament and came within one match of finishing no lower than eighth.

Receiving the "Outstanding Wrestler" Award was Tim Prescott, McPherson, the 119 pound champion.

Billy Ross, Derby, was named "Outstanding Coach" of the tour-

Norton's won-loss record was an outstanding 26-10 and their pin ratio was an impressive 8-1. The Norton coaches chose Troy Bainter as Norton's "Wrestler of the Week".

Former Norton state wrestling champion Nathan Broeckelman was present at the tournament as an assistant coach at Manhattan High School.

"I feel we really took a step forward this week," said Norton head wrestling coach Bill Johnson.

"I felt we wrestled with intensity and emotion in each and every match regardless of the outcome. We competed well in the matches we lost and learned from our mistakes. The losses should help us in the future.

"Our 26-10 won-loss record was good and we were only pinned one time! This is a huge improvement over last week in the J.R.Durham Tournament even though we won it."

Individual Norton wrestlers 103 - Freshman Branson Addington wrestled a feather bracket match to start his tournament action and won a 13-0 major decision over Jacob Wigers, Maize. In the first round, he was pinned in 3:17 by Shuan Bennett, Wichita Northwest. In the consolation bracket, he won a 5-3 decision over Gage Wells, Derby, then lost a 4-2 decision to Garrett Girard, Lawrence.

No.1 seed Javier Bieyra, Salina South, placed first with an 8-4 decision over No.3 seed Dalton Dietrich, Ark City. Third place winner was Daniel Wilson, Leavenworth, with a 3-2 decision over Jake Roberts, Clay Center. Girard placed fifth with a 3-2 decision over Jace Stone, Manhattan. Tommy Miller, Campus, finished seventh by forfeit over Bennett.

112 - Sophomore John Risewick was seeded No.2. He pinned Jacob Baker, Leavenworth, in 1:36, then won a 13-6 decision over Jaysten McClure, Maize South. Next, he wrestled No.3 seed Quinton Harrison, Newton, and lost an 8-3 decision. In the consolation bracket, he won a 10-0 major decision over Jeffrey Morrow, Derby, to reach the consolation finals. He lost a 7-5 decision to Mike Lindlar, Wichita Northwest to place fourth.

No.1 seed Dustin Reed, Colby, placed first with a 6-0 shutout of Harrison. Fifth place went to Justin Lombardo, Tulsa Union, with an 8-0 major decision over Morrow. Alex Garcia, Dodge City, finished in seventh with an 8-2 decision over Kaden Kretzer, McPherson.

130 - Senior Troy Bainter was seeded No.5. He pinned Wyatt Villers, Ark City, in 5:30, won 6-4 in overtime over Konnor Kriss, Colby and wrestled No.1 seed Daniel DeShazer, Wichita Heights, in the semi-finals. De-Shazer was undefeated and had pinned three wrestlers in the tournament. Troy was equal to the occasion and decisioned DeShazer 3-2 to reach the championship finals. He wrestled No.2 seed Brian Crutchmer, Tulsa Union, for the gold medal and lost a hard-fought 9-4 decison to finisher runner-up.

Colt McElroy, Garden City, placed third with a 6-3 decision over Skyler McComb, Derby. Kriss placed fifth with a forfeit by DeShazer. Shane Goetz, Hutchinson, placed seventh with a 7-4 decision over Jake Ellis, Mill Valley.

140 - Senior Billy Broeckelman was seeded No.1. He won a 15-2 major decision over Tyson Phillis, Garden City; pinned Tre Davis, Manhattan, in 2:22 and won a 12-2 major decision over Trey Dice, Ark City, to reach the semi-finals. A 10-5 loss to No.5 seed Trever Cox, Maize, dropped him into the consolation bracket. He won an 18-4 major decision over Trey Schrimscher, Wichita Heights, to reach the consolation finals where he placed third with a 15-4 major decision over Ben Becker, Derby.

Dustin Williams, Gardner-Edgerton, won the title with a 3-1 decision over Cox. Dice placed fifth by pinning Schrimscher in 4:24. Seventh place went to Noel over Phillis.

145 - Sophomore Eli Bozarth won a 10-1 major decision over Travis Steenson, McPherson, in a feather bracket match. In the first round, he lost a 6-4 decision to No.3 seed Andrew Denning, Lawrence. In the consolation bracket, he won a 6-1 decision over Jake Ryals, Salina South; decisioned Manny Luna, Hutchinson, 14-7; won a 3-2 decision over Jesse Garcia, Maize and lost a 4-1 decision to Chris Adler, Garden City, in the consolation semfinals.
