Senior night brings Jays' wrestling win

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Thursday was "Senior Night" for coach Bill Johnson's Norton Community High School wrestling team and the seniors led the team to an impressive 36-19 dual victory over Colby in the Wilmeth Kirk Memorial Gym in Norton.

Norton won eight of the 14 matches, lost four and won one by forfeit at 119 pounds. The Jays also forfeited at 215 pounds.

Several matches were between Norton and Colby wrestlers who had met before.

For instance, at 112 pounds Norton sophomore John Risewick wrestled sophomore Dustin Reed whom he had lost to by a 6-3 decision in the St. Francis Tournament. Although they did not meet in the Newton Tournament, Reed was the 112 pound champion.

Risewick displayed his wrestling abilities against the talented and unbeaten Reed with a 7-4 decision on Thursday night to hand him his first loss of the season! For his performance, Risewick was named "Wrestler of the Week" by the Norton coaches.

Norton's 130 pound wrestler senior Troy Bainter lost a 3-1 overtime decision to Colby's Konner Kriss in the St. Francis Tournament. At Newton, the two met again and Bainter won 6-4, also in overtime.

On Thursday they met again, and Bainter won again, this time by a 7-3 decision.

Norton senior Landon "Tug" Keiswetter moved up from 160 to 171 pounds in Thursday's dual and won a hard-fought 1-0 decision over Andrew Flanigan.

Keiswetter has not wrestled Flanigan but Norton senior Spencer Shirk, who moved up to 189 on Thursday, pinned Flanigan to win the gold medal at St. Francis, decisioned him 10-6 in their first match at Newton and decisioned him 10-5 in their second match at Newton to win the consolation championship.

Flanigan's only losses this season so far have been to the two Norton wrestlers.

Blue Jay senior 285 pound wrestler Josh Asbury wrestled Zell Bieberle of Colby for the second time. He was pinned by Bieberle at St. Francis but wrestled much better this time around. Asbury led 1-0 in the match before losing it 3-1 in overtime.

Norton Blue Jays outscore Smith Center Redmen

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com On Thursday, coach Doug Reusink's Norton Community High School boys basketball team followed a disappointing 63-62 loss in the first round of the Mid-Continent League Tournament to No.1 seed Plainville with a 76-65 overtime win over Smith Center in the consolation bracket on Thursday in Smith Center.

The Blue Jays lacked consistency in the game but were up to the challenge in the extra period to win and advance in the tournament.

Norton led 17-7 after one quarter and 33-17 at intermission. The Redmen outscored them 17-10 in the third quarter but Norton still led 43-34 with one period remaining. Smith Center also outscored them 23-16 with a furious fourth quarter rally that tied the game at 59-all.

Junior forward Jordan Wahlmeier and junior guard Dillon McConney each added a basket and junior guard Tye Nickell hit two free throws as Norton pulled away for the 11-point win.

Norton got off to a good start, outscoring Smith Center 17-7 in the first quarter. Seven different players tallied for the Blue Jays. Senior forward Dakota Dreher, Wahlmeier, McConney, senior post Luke Ninemire and Lane each hit a basket. Nickell added a trey and sophomore forward Jacob Brooks hit a basket and two charities.

The Redmen made a comeback in the third quarter when they outscored the Blue Jays 17-10. Norton's points came on two baskets each by Wahlmeier and McConney and one by Lane.

Norton also had a good fourth quarter, scoring 16 points, but the home standing Redmen were rallying and scored 23 points to tie the score and send it into overtime.

For the first time this year, Norton had four scorers in double figures. Lane led with 25 points on 7 of 15 two-point shots for 47 percent and 11 of 15 free throws for 73 percent accuracy.

Wahlmeier ended with 19 points on 9 of 12 from two-point range for 75 percent and 1 of 2 free throws for 50 percent.

Nickell scored 11 points on 1 of 1 from long range for 100 percent, 2 of 10 two-point tries for 20 percent and 3 of 11 overall for 27 percent. He hit 4 of 5 charities for 80 percent.

McConney added 10 points on 5 of 7 two-point shots for 71 percent.

Leading scorer for Smith Cen-2. ter was Nathan Cox with 19 points. Kale Terrill scored 16 and Alex Hobelmann tallied 15 for the Redmen. As a team, Norton hit 1 of 6 trey tries for 17 percent, 27 of 54 twopoint attempts for 50 percent and 28 of 60 overall for 47 percent. Smith Center connected on 5

of 25 from beyond the arc for 20 percent, 20 of 39 two-point tries for 51 percent and 25 of 64 overall for 39 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton swished 19 of 28 for 68 percent and the Redmen hit 10 of 19 for 53 percent.

Norton grabbed 15 offensive and 30 defensive rebounds for a whopping 45 total. Smith Center pulled down 8 offensive and 16 defensive boards for only 24 total.



Blue Jays take fifth in Mid-Continent League Tournament

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The No.9 seeded Norton Community High School boys basketball team placed fifth in the Mid-Continent League Tournament with a 48-42 win over No.7 seed Hill City on Saturday in the Gross Coliseum in Hays.

The Blue Jays had a good tournament.

After losing their first round game by one point to unbeaten No.1 seed and eventual champion Plainville and dropping into the consolation bracket, they beat Smith Center 76-65 in overtime to advance to the game with Hill City.

The Blue Jays led 13-5 after one quarter over the Ringnecks and outscored Hill City 13-9 in the second period to build a comfortable 26-14 lead at intermission.

The Ringnecks had other plans in the second half and came out fired up and ready to challenge the Blue Jays. They did just that and outscored Norton 12-8 in the third stanza to cut Norton's advantage to 34-26.

Hill City continued to challenge Norton in the final quarter when they cut the Blue Jay lead to 38-36 on two straight three-point shots by Matt Craig with 5:15 left in the game.

Norton senior guard Terrell Lane scored but Hill City added another basket. Junior forward Jordan Wahlmeier hit a basket with 3:43 left but two Hill City free throws made it 42-40. Norton sophomore forward Jacob Brooks stole the ball, passed to Lane and

he passed to junior guard Tye Nickell who scored with 3:02 remaining!

With Norton still leading 44-40, Wahlmeier stole the ball but Norton could not score. The next time the Blue Jays got the ball, Brooks fed Lane inside for two more Norton points and the Blue Jays were on top 46-40 with 1:46 left. Once again, the Blue Jay defense was equal to the occasion and they regained possession. Lane tallied again with 52 seconds left on the scoreboard clock and Norton led 48-40.

A last second basket by the Ringnecks was too little, too late as Norton prevailed 48-42.

An unusual aspect of the game is that there were not enough Hill City fouls for Norton to shoot any free throws and the Ringnecks only shot 4 charities, hitting 3.

"We played well in the first half but then we let them get within two points of us," said Norton head boys basketball coach Doug Reusink.

"After they came so close, we did some things right offensively to stretch our lead.

"We need to quit coasting and relaxing when we get a lead and finish strong.

"Overall, I'm proud of how we played in the tournament, winning three out of four games, which included a close loss to Plainville.

"We've now won four of our last five games and brought our record up to 6-7 overall.

'We'll need another good effort tonight when we host an excellent Goodland team."

Wahlmeier and Lane led Norton in scoring with 16 points each. Wahlmeier hit 8 of 13 shots for 62 percent accuracy and Lane connected on 2 of 5 from beyond the arc for 40 percent, 5 of 6 twopoint tries for a net-smoking 83 percent and was 7 of 11 overall for 64 percent.

Reggie Jordan was Hill City's only double figure scorer. He also hit 16 points.

As a team, Norton connected on 2 of 10 long range shots for 20 percent, 21 of 37 two-point tries for 57 percent and 23 of 47 overall for 49 percent.

Hill City swished 3 of 11 treys for 27 percent, 15 of 33 two-point attempts for 45 percent and 18 of 44 overall for 41 percent.

Norton had 7 offensive and 18 defensive rebounds for 25 total. Hill City grabbed 5 offensive and 11 defensive caroms for 16 total.

Lane and Wahlmeier also led the Blue Jays in rebounds, pulling down 10 each. They were followed by McConney, Brooks, 2 each; Ninemire, 1.

Norton had 9 steals and Hill City had 2. Again, Wahlmeier and Lane were leaders, this time with 3 thefts each. McConney, Nickell and Brooks each had 1 steal.

The Blue Jays had 18 offensive assists compared to just 4 for the Ringnecks. Lane and Brooks each had 5 assists, followed by Nickell, Wahlmeier, 3 each; McConney, Hartwell, 1 each.

Ninemire had 3 charges taken. Norton had just 10 turnovers compared to 13 for Hill City.

Scores of other games

Plainville and Stockton, two unbeaten teams and the No.1 and No.2 seeds, played for the championship and the Cardinals won 72-49.

Third place went to Osborne with a 49-36 victory over Phillipsburg.

Ellis placed seventh with a 68-47 win over Smith Center.
