Norton Lady Jays upset state ranked **Smith Center quintet**

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The No.4 seeded Norton Community High School girls basketball team was equal to the challenge Friday night when they upset the No.1 seeded and No.2 state ranked (3A) Smith Center quintet 39-32 in the championship semi-finals of the Mid-Continent League Tournament in Gross Memorial Coliseum in Hays.

It was the first loss for Smith Center this season and put Norton in Saturday's championship finals versus No.2 seed and No.1 state ranked (2A) Hill City.

On the strength of 10 points on 5 baskets by Smith Center's McKenzie Benoit in the first quarter, the favored Lady Red took an 18-10 lead after one quarter. Norton's points in the period came from two baskets from beyond the arc by sophomore guard Tawni Griffey, a two-point basket by junior post Erin Terrell and two free throws by senior guard Dustyna Sprigg.

It turned out to be by far Smith Center's best scoring quarter of the game as the Lady Jay defense kicked in and limited the Lady Red to just 14 more points the rest of the game!

With Griffey and Sprigg leading the way, Norton outscored Smith Center 15-5 in the second quarter to lead 25-23 at halftime. Griffey hit another trey and two two-point baskets and Sprigg hit two two-pointers and two charity tosses. Junior post Caren Thomson also hit a two-point basket.

The Lady Jay defense was also equal to the occasion in the second half where they held Smith Center scoreless in the third quarter and allowed them only 9 points in the final stanza.

Norton scored just 6 points in the third period on two baskets by Griffey and one by Thomson but extended the lead to 31-23.

The Lady Red did not give up without a fight and cut the Norton lead to 32-29 with 58 seconds left. Sprigg was fouled with 48 seconds remaining and hit both charities to seal the deal!

Griffey hit two free throws, Sprigg hit another charity and Terrell put the punctuation on the victory with a layup on a fast break with 2 seconds left!

"It's always tough playing Smith Center," said Norton head girls basketball coach Kevin Jilka. "We were down by eight points after one quarter but worked hard to get the lead by halftime. We gained some confidence and played well in the second half. Our defense did a great job in the second half; keeping them from scoring in the third quarter was great. We got defensive stops when we needed them.

"We also made our free throws down the stretch.

"I'm so proud of our girls' tremendous effort!"

Griffey was leading scorer for the Lady Jays with 19 points on a net-smoking 3 of 4 from beyond the arc for 75 percent, 4 of 11 twopoint tries for 36 percent and 7 of 15 overall for 47 percent. She was also 2 of 3 from the charity stripe for 67 percent.

Sprigg was also in double figures for Norton with 11 points on 2 of 4 from the field for 50 percent and 7 of 10 charities for a very accurate 70 percent.

Top scorer for Smith Center was Benoit, who hit only one more basket in the game after swishing five in the first quarter and ended with 12 points.

As a team, Norton hit 3 of 6 from long range for 50 percent, 10 of 32 two-point tries for 31 percent and 13 of 38 overall for 34 percent.

The Lady Red missed all 6 trey tries, hit 14 of 42 two-point field goal tries for 33 percent and were 14 of 48 overall for 29 percent.

The Lady Jays made 10 of 18 free throw attempts for 56 percent and the Lady Red hit 4 of 8 for 50 percent.

Norton had 5 offensive and 16 defensive rebounds for 21 total and Smith Center grabbed 8 offensive and 16 defensive caroms for 24 total.

Thomson and Terrell led Norton in rebounds with 7 each, followed by Griffey, 4; Sprigg, 2; Rossi, 1.

The Lady Jays had 14 steals compared to just 8 for the Lady Red. Terrell was the leader with 7 thefts, followed by Thomson, 4; Rossi, 2; Sprigg, 1.

Both teams had 5 offensive assists. Rossi had 2 and Griffey, Terrell and Thomson each had 1.

The Lady Jays had 4 charges taken. Rossi had 2, Terrell and Thomson had 1 each.

Norton had 21 turnovers and Smith Center had 19.

The Huskies started the game in the first quarter by sinking two three pointers. Colton Lowry and Dusty Eagleburger were the scorers. Thunder Ridge also hit a three point shot along with five, 2 pointers to take the lead 13-6.

During the second quarter, the Huskies picked up the pace scoring 12. Phillip Compton and Gunnar Hays each hit a three point shot followed by Austin Herman and Tyler Montgomery each sinking a two point shot. Eagleburger added to the Husky tally with two of three free throws. Thunder Ridge slacked off a bit scoring seven, three, 2 pointers and one free throw. The first half ended with Thunder Ridge leading 20-18.

In the third quarter the Huskies continued scoring. Lowry and Eagleburger were the only Huskies to score, each hitting a two and a three pointer. Thunder Ridge kept up their momentum and scored 14 points with a three pointer, five, 2 pointers and one free throw giving them a much larger lead of 34-28.

The Huskies maintained their scoring. Twelve points were put on the board, a two point basket and two free throws by Lowry followed by Eagleburger wth a three point shot, Herman and Montgomery with two each and Compton with one of two free throws. Thunder Ridge held on to their lead by scoring 19 more points. six, 2 pointers and seven out of 14 free throws wining the game 53-40.

Husky head coach Chuck Fessenden said, "It was another hard fought game between us and Thunder Ridge. We gave them too many shots on the inside. As a result their field goal percentage was too high. We need to develop an offensive threat on the inside. We are depending too much on our perimeter game."

The leading rebounder was Lowry with six, followed by Eagleburger and Montgomey with five each. Leading assists was Brant Tharman with five.

It was a close game in junior varsity play against Thunder Ridge. Thunder Ridge took the win 46-45. The leading Husky scorers were Phillip Compton with 13 followed by Tyler Montgomery, 8 and Jordan Barid 7. The leading rebounder was Hunter Chandler with 6.
