Norton wrestlers to compete in regionals

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School wrestling team will compete in the Class 3-2-1-A Regional Wrestling Tournament this Friday and Saturday in Goodland.

Norton, defending state champion and ranked No.1 all season, will be the favorite in what is considered to be the toughest regional out of the four in the state.

In addition to Norton, teams will be competing from No.2 state ranked Hoxie, No.7 state ranked Scott City and No.8 state ranked Goodland.

Other teams competing are: Atwood, Bird City-Cheylin, Cimarron, Elkhart, Ellis, Thomas More Prep-Hays, Hill City, Holcomb, Lakin, Leoti, Meade, Montezuma, Oakley, Oberlin, Plainville, Quinter, St. Francis, Stockton,

A total of 34 of the 84 state ranked individual wrestlers are expected to compete in this regional for berths in next week's state tournament.

"This is an extremely tough tournament with state ranked wrestlers in every weight class but one," said Norton head coach Bill Johnson.

"There are as many as four state-ranked wrestlers in some weight classes. Early in the season, state rankings were not as accurate but by now wrestlers have proven the accuracy of their standings.

"We have no unbeaten wrestlers but we think this is good because we have wrestled an extremely tough schedule. Our goal every year is that everything prior to regional and state wrestling is

practice. No matter what our individual records, every one of our wrestlers has a shot at qualifying for state."

The top four finishers in each weight class in each of the four regionals qualifies for next weekend's State Tournament in Hays.

"We expect to be in 100 percent condition for this weekend's competition," said coach Johnson. "We've battled some sickness but hope to have everybody ready to go."

Blue Jay boys basketball team outscores Atwood

Following a 14-all first quarter, Norton outscored Atwood 24-8 in the second period to take a 38-22 halftime advantage. A 17-11 third quarter in favor of the Blue Jays boosted the lead to 55-33 and Norton added three more points to the final margin of victory with a 13-10 fourth quarter.

"We got off to a slow start on the defensive end but were able to apply some effective full court pressure which got us going in the second quarter," said coach Reusink.

"I did think we played better defensively and rebounded better in the second half and, on the offensive end, we got on a roll, which was good to see."

Sophomore guard Jacob Brooks hit a reverse layup for Norton's first points in the game and just kept hitting shots the rest of the way. Brooks scored 7 of his game-high 23 points in the first quarter on three baskets and a free throw.

Junior forward Jordan Wahlmeier also had a good scoring game as he threw in 19 points for the Blue Jays. He hit one basket in the first quarter, along with junior guard Dillon McConney and senior post Luke Ninemire.

Four different players tallied for Norton in their 24 point second quarter. Senior guard Terrell Lane scored his first points of the contest as he hit three two-point baskets and one from beyond the arc. Brooks still had his shooting eye as he hit two more two-point baskets and buried a three-pointer. Wahlmeier swished two baskets and a free throw and junior guard Tye Nickell hit a basket and charity toss.

In the third quarter, Brooks connected on two more baskets and a free throw, Wahlmeier hit two more baskets, Lane buried a trey; Nickell hit 3 charities.

Wahlmeier was high scorer for Norton in the final stanza with three baskets and a free throw. Brooks and Nickell each added another basket and Lane was accurate on two charities.

Brooks hit his only shot from long range, was 8 of 14 from twopoint range for 57 percent and ended with 9 of 15 for an excellent 60 percent average! He also hit 4 of 6 charities for 67 percent.

Wahlmeier hit 8 of 17 shots for 47 percent and was 3 of 7 from the charity stripe for 43 percent.

Lane scored 14 points on 2 of 4 from long range, 3 of 6 two-point

shots and 5 of 10 overall for 50 percent. He was perfect on two free throws.

Leading scorer for Atwood was Argabright with 22 points.

As a team, Norton swished 3 of 7 from beyond the arc for 43 percent, 23 of 50 two-point attempts for 46 percent and 26 of 57 overall for 46 percent. Atwood missed all 12 trey tries and hit 18 of 38 two-point attempts for 48 percent. Overall, the Buffaloes were 18 of 50 for 36 percent.

Norton had 13 offensive and 15 defensive rebounds for 28 total and the Buffaloes grabbed 14 offensive and 12 defensive caroms for 26 total.

Wahlmeier led Norton in rebounds with 7, followed by Lane, 6; Brooks, 5; Ninemire, 3; Zach Hartwell, 2; John Renner, Cole Archer, Nickell, Trey Millan, Andrew Ellis, 1 each.

The Blue Jays had 7 blocked
