Water awareness week next week

Protecting groundwater is the aim of National Ground Water Awareness Week, March 6-12.

Groundwater is important to every person, and there is something every person can do to be a good groundwater steward: That's the core message of the 2011 National Ground Water Awareness Week March 6-12.

"We all have a stake in groundwater, so every person should consider what he or she can do to preserve and protect groundwa-

ter," said Cliff Treyens, public awareness director for the National Ground Water Association (NGWA), which began the annual recognition week more than a decade ago.

"Many people taking just a step or two to protect groundwater can make a big difference," Treyens said. "Groundwater Awareness Week is all about taking that first step."

Treyens explained that consumers' daily habits can effect on

groundwater quality.

"How you store, use and dispose of hazardous household substances can affect groundwater quality. In the same manner, whether you regularly maintain your water well or septic system, or properly decommission an abandoned well can impact the groundwater that serves as someone's water supply," Treyens said.

"In addition to privately owned wells, many public water systems

use groundwater. Just about everybody has a stake in protecting groundwater," he said.

The public, particularly well owners, can learn more about groundwater stewardship at NGWA's Web site, <<http://www.wellowner.org>>www.wellowner.org. This site contains more useful information about groundwater protection as well as water testing and treatment.

"Water wells can provide an excellent supply of good quality

water. For generations wells have been the only means for obtaining a reliable source of drinking water for millions of Americans in many parts of the country," Treyens said. "That's why it's important to continually educate the public about how matters such as water well flooding, abandoned water wells, naturally occurring contamination and poor well maintenance can affect groundwater quality," Treyens said.

Those in forestry get help

State Conservationist Eric B. Banks for the Natural Resources Conservation Service has announced the cutoff date of March 4 for the multi-state forestry Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI).

The Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative, now in its second year, provides financial and technical assistance to owners and operators of agricultural and nonindustrial private forestlands.

"Farmers, ranchers and owners of forestland play pivotal roles in protecting and enhancing natural

resources," Banks said. "Our goal is to support projects that will improve the health of the natural resources on their land and bring the environmental and economic benefits of conservation to their local communities."

According to Banks, Natural Resources Conservation Service in Kansas, North Dakota, South Dakota and Nebraska is partnering with their state forestry agencies to address two areas of critical need in these Northern Plains states.

These include shelterbelts that are old and no longer providing

the benefits they used to and forests along rivers and streams that are in decline due to human-caused changes to river channels and stream flows.

Emergency disaster loan deadline

The expiration date for filing applications for Emergency Disaster loans by farmers and ranchers in Norton and Phillips Counties is March 15, according to John C. Vogt, Farm Loan Manager, for the Farm Service Agency.

Vogt advised that those needing farm credit as a result of severe storms, flooding and tornadoes from June 1, 2010 and continuing and who think they are eligible for Farm Service Agency assistance, should make their applications at the Norton County Farm Service Agency Office, before the expiration date.

"Loans covering physical and/or production losses may be made at 3.75 percent interest rate, and

are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay," said Vogt.

Farm Service Agency Loans covering physical losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, livestock, or building (including homes), lost through this disaster.

Farm Service Agency loans covering production losses may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to make payments on real estate and chattel debts. "Funds can also be used for other essential operating and living expenses" Vogt said.

To be eligible for an emergency disaster loan, an applicant must be operating a family size farm

or ranch, must be unable to get credit elsewhere, and must have suffered a qualifying physical and/or production loss from the disaster.

Farmers who suffered at least a 30 percent reduction to at least one cropping enterprise, may have a qualifying production loss. Emergency disaster production loss loans cover 100 percent of qualifying losses.
