The expiration date for filing applications for Emergency Disaster loans by farmers and ranchers in Norton and Phillips Counties is March 15, according to John C. Vogt, Farm Loan Manager, for the Farm Service

Agency. Vogt advised that those needing farm credit as a result of severe storms, flooding ad tornadoes from June 1,2010 and continuing and who think they are eligible for Farm Service Agency assistance, should make their applications at the Norton County Farm Service Agency Office, before the expiration date.

"Loans covering physical and/ or production losses may be made at 3.75 percent interest rate, and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay," said Vogt.

Farm Service Agency Loans covering physical losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, livestock, or building (including homes), lost through this disaster. Farm Service Agency loans

covering production losses may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to make payments on real estate and chattel debts. "Funds can also be used for other essential operating and living expenses" Vogt said. To be eligible for an emergency

disaster loan, an applicant must

be operating a family size farm

or ranch, must be unable to get credit elsewhere, and must have suffered a qualifying physical and/or production loss from the

Farmers who suffered at least a 30 percent reduction to at least one cropping enterprise, may have a qualifying production loss. Emergency disaster production loss loans cover 100 percent of qualifying losses.
