Alright, go ahead. Guess which garden vegetable is growing in popularity faster than any of the rest. Back in the 60s, you seldom saw it on the dinner table, let alone in the garden. In fact, most gardeners couldn't even spell it! I've learned to like it, kinda, but only when utilized in a good thick soup; heavy on the cheese, please! I set out about 20 homegrown plants about the 15th of April each year, and we freeze most of the crop. It is relatively easy to grow here in Northwest Kansas, but it must be transplanted into the garden as early as possible since it detests heat. Those young plants can withstand a bit of frost, but must be protected from the wind. Those loathsome cabbage worms can be a serious threat to broccoli and can decimate a crop rather quickly once they arrive if we don't catch them in time.

Always buy your transplants at a reputable garden center. Varieties to look for include Packman, Green Comet, or Premium Crop.
