I made it for my family and they loved it but now I can't find the clipping. They expect it every year during Lent." I am so glad another family is enjoying Joan's Shrimp Enchiladas as much as we did.

JOAN'S SHRIMP ENCHI-**LADAS**

Twelve 6-inch flour tortillas

Cook's Corner Liza Deines

One-pound bag of tiny frozen shrimp, thawed

Two boxes frozen spinach,

thawed and squeezed dry Six or eight little green onions,

chopped (green part, too) One can low sodium cream of

celery soup One 16-ounce carton low fat sour cream

One teaspoon Old Bay season-

ing, salt and pepper Two to three cups shredded

Monterey Jack cheese Two 10-ounce cans green chile

enchilada sauce Mix shrimp, spinach, season-

ings, green onions and about half a cup of shredded cheese lightly together. Mix the soup and sour cream together with three tablespoons of the green chile sauce. Butter the bottom of a 9x13

glass baking dish and spread a light skim of the sour cream and soup mixture on bottom. Stir the remainder into the shrimp mix-

ture. Warm tortillas in a damp, heated paper towel so they will be easy to roll. Fill each tortilla with a couple of spoonfuls of shrimp filling. Roll up and place in pan with seam side down.

Pour the two cans of enchilada sauce evenly over the pan of rolled tortillas, top with a good layer of shredded cheese and bake in a 350 degree oven for 20-25 minutes until hot and bubbly. Let rest about 10 minutes before serving so the enchiladas will firm up a bit. Joan served this with black bean and corn salsa.

Shrimp in any form is one of my favorite foods, so when a resident here at The Carlyle offered me some shrimp dip left over from a family Super Bowl party, I accepted with alacrity and appetite. Shrimp dip is a very popular dish and I'd eaten a lot of it over the years but this one was just a bit different so, of course, I begged the recipe to share with you.

MARY LEE'S SUPER BOWL SHRIMP DIP

Two cans medium shrimp Eight ounces Louis Kemp 'krab" chunks

One tablespoon lemon juice Three dashes Tabasco One tablespoon Worcestershire

Eight ounces whipped cream cheese

Eight ounces sour cream Two tablespoons shredded on-

ion with juice

Two tablespoons teeny tiny diced celery bits

One tablespoon capers, squashed into paste with a fork

One envelope dry Italian salad dressing

Mix sour cream and cream cheese and all other ingredients except shrimp and crab. Fold them in last so they don't break up. Chill overnight. Serve with crackers, chips or fresh veggie sticks. If you are fortunate enough to have any leftover dip, this one is chunky enough to spread on toast for a light supper with a salad.

Shrimp Lovers, Alert! If you ever travel to Galveston, Texas, be sure to visit Gaido's Restaurant and order their "Angels on Horseback". Shrimp grilled on a skewer and served in a long, toasted bun doused with melted garlic butter. Extravagantly expensive both in calories and cash but so worth it!


