Commissioners unsure on rural cemeteries

There is some concern over who is going to mow at least one Norton County cemetery. Norton County commissioners looked into a mowing problem at their end-of-the-month meeting last Tuesday. After hearing earlier in May about a letter sent to some residents about the county no longer mowing some cemeteries, the commissioners asked that someone bring in a copy of the letter so they could know exactly what is going on.. Last Tuesday, rural Densmore resident Kenneth Riemann did just that. The letter, issued by the Solomon Township trustees, to those with family buried in the Mt. Calvary Cemetery, which is in West Union Township, said that future mowing of the area will be up to them.

The commissioners discussed the problem with County Attorney Doug Sebelius but no one is sure if the land is owned by the Catholic Diocese of Salina or not. If the area is owned by the diocese, it needs to be taken care of by the church. The commission will check to make sure to whom the cemetery belongs. However, they assured Riemann that they will make sure it is properly maintained.

In other business, the commission: • Held a 15-minute closed session to discuss non-elected personnel. • Heard from County Treasurer Cynthia Linner that the county had deposited \$32,480 in sales tax revenue in May. That is \$6,000 more than last month, she said.

City to get new sewage dump tank at sewer plant

Norton will get a bulk sewage dump tank at the sewer plant provided by Larry Patterson of Septic Tech. Septic Tech made a proposal to the city to provide and install two cement tanks, sewer grinders, backflows, valves and other necessary plumbing and materials for a bulk sewage dump tank at a point at the sewer plant to be selected by City Administrator Rob Lawson and Chris Frack. Septic Tech will provide the installation except electrical, and then be given credit for dumping until the value of the materials and installation are depleted. Then the company will pay a monthly fee. At its meeting last Wednesday, the Norton City Council agreed that the service will be available to the public and the Utility Committee will come up with a rate. The council also agreed to donate \$600 to Options, formerly the Northwest Kansas Domestic and Sexual Violence Services, for the help they give to Norton County residents. The group provides 24-hour service within the Northwest Kansas counties. In 2010, it helped 13 domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Norton County.
