Former clinic slated to house the college nursing program

With the recent opening of a new Norton Medical Clinic, leaders of the Norton County Hospital announced recently that needs of the college programming. The details of that renovation, however, are yet to be finalized.

"We are developing a plan to secure financing once we know what the cost of the project is going to be," said Scott Sproul, Norton's Economic Development Director. "We're planning to actively seek funding once we get the bids back to know how much funding we need." Miller reported that a portion of the clinic building will undergo extensive renovation to include three classroom spaces and the newer wing of the building will only undergo some slight changes.

cbell@nwkansas.com In an effort to reduce costs and conserve energy, Monday morning, the Norton school board approved bids and financing for heating system upgrades for the district.

For about a year, the district has been exploring options to enhance energy conservation, particularly for heating and lighting. School leaders have been working with a company called 360 Energy Solutions, based in Lawrence, to iron out a plan to upgrade some mechanical aspects of school buildings. With the energy savings, the upgrades are expected to pay for themselves over time.

Norton Superintendent Greg Mann reported Tuesday that the upgrades include the replacement of boilers at the junior/senior high school campus and the Eishenhower Elementary campus, along with the elimination of boilers at the East Campus.

"We're replacing stuff that is past its useful life," Mann said. "At the east campus, we have two boilers for a relatively small space and those will be replaced with a zonal heating system."

The general contracting for the project, expected to be completed by mid-October, will be handled by 360 Energy Solutions and is expected to cost just over \$1 million. The project is financed through a loan from The Bank in Norton. The loan will be financed at 4.75 percent over 15 years with a total payback amount of about \$1.5 million.

Historically, schools have been limited on options to finance large renovation projects. Mann explained, however, that thanks to recent legislation that encourages schools to complete energy conservation projects, the district can use nearly any revenue source to fund the project, including the general fund. "A special statute allows districts to borrow money for energy performance upgrades," the Superintendent said." The loan can be paid back with any funding source the school receives, including the general fund. We won't have to make a first payment until spring of 2013, so we have some time to figure out the best way to pay for the project."

Song-writer to perform in Norton on July 14

As part of the Norton Public Library's summer reading program, a Norton native and musician will be bringing his kid-friendly act to Norton this month.

Randy Sauer will perform at the Norton Public Library on July 14 as part of the library's summer reading program. Randy's Music Jam is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. and is open to the public.

Sauer grew up in Norton and graduated from Norton High School in 1985. Now a resident of Hays, the Elementary Music teacher spends his summers traveling around Nebraska and Kansas, sharing his original compositions intended to teach children about the technical aspects of music.

"I started writing music as an education tool to use in my classrooms," Sauer said. "The kids really enjoyed what I was writing and people told me I should start putting on shows to perform the music I was writing."

After deciding to take his show on the road, Sauer puts on music programs for children across Nebraska and Kansas.

The shows include interactive music with motions and actions to help the children learn about musical elements like rhythm and notes." I write a lot of songs with actions and easy words for the kids to sing along with," Sauer said. "I like to get the kids involved because that helps them learn about music through music."

A recent addition to Sauer's act has been a "trashcan" band and in his shows. the songwriter likes to get the kids involved in creating music with him. He uses a collection of trashcans and other household items, like wooden spoons, to teach musical concepts.

In addition to the live shows, Sauer has created and produced three musical albums targeted to elementary-age children. In addition, he is working on a DVD for children. "A lot of my music includes actions and interactive elements," he said. "Those elements lend themselves well to a DVD because they are visual as well as musical."

4K for Cancer ride passes through Norton

Determined to raise awareness about the trials that come with a cancer diagnosis, a group of students and college graduates passed through Norton Wednesday and Thursday on a bike tour across the nation.
