of biking, running/walking, and a water activity in addition to navigating the route by map, an adventure race is a team event that provides participants excitement, teamwork, and well, adventure. On Aug. 20, southwest Nebraska will play host to the inaugural "Valley Adventure Race" sponsored and organized by Ag Valley Coop and Tri Valley Healthy Living Center. Margo Kent, a veteran of adventure racing, is also assisting with the organization of the event.

In an adventure race, teams consisting of three individuals work their way through a course

while always remaining together. They also complete challenges at various checkpoints and are not given the route of the race until they reach the starting line. The thrill of adventure racing is open to all experience levels and gives racers an immense feeling of accomplishment when they finish, no matter their placing.

Race director Christina Houghtelling of Tri Valley Healthy Living Center immediately jumped on board when approached with the idea of Valley Adventure Race by Kevin Nielson of Ag Valley Coop. She and co-director Margo Kent are now very eager for adventure racing to come to southwest Nebraska.
